FOURTH ANNUAL HORSE SHOW TO BE HELD SOON

Plans Near Completion For Mounted Posse Presentation Here June 30, July 1.

Ten gallon hats and fancy cowboy boots are becoming a common sight on Medford streets as the Jackson County Mounted Sheriff's Posse swings into action with final preparations for their big fourth annual Rodeo and Horse Show.

Dates for the show are Saturday night June 30, starting with a big downtown street parade at seven o'clock in which over 500 saddle horses will appear; and Sunday afternoon July 1. Entries are pouring in from some of the top contestants from all over the country.

have been programmed in a twenty-six page souvenir program containing lists and rules of all events along with many pictures of the Posse, officers and members.

Bucking horses of national repute are filling the corral in readiness for the big rodeo.

Events will consist of bronco and bareback riding, bull riding, calf roping, steer stopping, stock horse classes, musical chair races, wild cow milking, \$25,000 Stallion parade, Tennessee Walking horses, five gaited saddle horses, Palomino class, mounted drills by the Sheriff's Posse and the Ladies Mounted Troop; as well as other added attractions. Harold "Happy" O'Neal, famous rodeo clown with his mule "Skim Milk," will be here to entertain the crowds both days.

General chairman and producer of the show will be "Flash" Fidler, rodeo announcer and comedian, assisted by Dr. Charles Lemery on tickets and finance; Red Cullen in charge of grounds; Bill Grenbemer handling police; Walter Hamby on entries; Chet Leonard on program and advertising and "Bernie" Thumler, livestock and transportation.

Rodeo headquarters have been opened at 45 South Central avenue for early entries and general information.

KENTUCKY DERBY WON BY HOOP JR., ON MUDDY TRACK

Pot O'Luck Second, and Darby Dieppe Third — Rain Mars Classic.

Louisville, Ky., June 9 — (U.P.) — Hoop Jr., bred to the racing purple of a Florida millionaire, splattered over the muddy track of Churchill Downs today to win the 71st annual running of the Kentucky Derby before a rain-soaked throng of 65,000.

The fleet three-year-old of Fred W. Hooper, who moved his breeding farms to Alabama after making his fortune as a contractor around Jacksonville, Fla., went to the post the favorite and ran up to that rating, leading from the start and winning Going Away by six lengths.

Pot O'Luck, the second choice in the betting, ran second and to keep the odds running true to form, Darby Dieppe, the third ranking favorite, was third in this richest derby of all time.

The Margin between the second and third horses was a half length, with Air Sailor number four in the field of 16.

That large entry gave Hoop Jr., not only the blanket of roses and glory that go with America's premier horse race, but also \$64,850—\$115 more than Pensive won in the 1944 classic.

Ridden superbly by the veteran Arden Arcaro, Hoop Jr. covered the heavy going of a mile and a quarter in 2:07, far off the record time of 2:01 2/5 set by Whirlaway in 1941.

But the track was different today after almost three continuous days of rain and that time was not considered too bad. It appeared that the Hooper champion had plenty left at the finish and could have bettered that time had it been necessary.

For Arcaro it was his third Derby victory—tying him in that respect with Earle Sande and Isaac Murphy. His previous winners were Lawrin in 1938 and Whirlaway in 1941.

WAGNER-LEONE BOUT IS SOUGHT

Wrestling fans have been hounding Promoter Mack Lillard for the past several weeks to match Antone Leone, the ape-like spreader of terror from Oyster Bay, New York, with George Wagner, self-styled toast of the coast for a bout at Medford armory.

Lillard said Saturday that such a bout is likely and he has offered terms which the bone-crushers are said to be considering. Otis Clingman, veteran muscle mangle from Eugene, has expressed a desire to meet Wagner, Leone or any other man Lillard may choose and will possibly be considered for a top spot if the Wagner-Leone negotiations fall through.

Kenny Ackles, who dumped Wagner last week, and Georges Dusette will also be on hand Thursday night, Lillard indicated. The complete card will be announced Monday.

DETROIT SCORES WIN OVER CHISOX TO RETAIN LEAD

New York, June 9 — (U.P.) — Detroit's Tigers indicated today that they may be tough to dislodge from first place in the American League as they rallied for four runs in the last inning and a 7 to 6 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

Trailing 3 to 6, the Tigers went to work on Haynes, the same pitcher who hurled a one-hitter against them earlier this season in their half of the ninth. Maier and Swift singled and reliever pitcher Eaton doubled. Caldwell replaced Haynes and fumbled Webb's sacrifice. Mayo then tripled and the ball game was over.

The magic that makes stars out of ordinary ballplayers who take over center field for the New York Yankees worked again today for George Stainback, who stepped into John Lindell's shoes and hit a three-run sixth-inning home run that broke the back of the Boston Red Sox and led the Yanks to a 13 to 7 win.

A ninth-inning single by Hoag of the Cleveland Indians beat the Browns for the second straight day by a 2 to 1 score. The blow broke up a pitching duel between Klieman and Hollingsworth of St. Louis.

Roger Wolf, traded by Philadelphia to Washington for Bobo Newsom, beat Newsom and the Athletics, 3 to 2, effectively scattering 11 hits.

In the National League, the going continued rough for the New York Giants, who were shut out by Lefty Logan and the Boston Braves 4 to 0.

The Chicago Cubs jumped on old Walter Beck in the first inning, scoring three runs toward what finally ended in a 5 to 1 defeat of the Cincinnati Reds.
