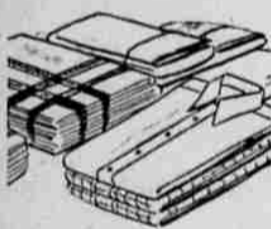
During the meeting Mrs. Marjorie Pearson conducted a memorial service, with Mrs. Hodgkins acting as soloist.
