THIRD, SEVENTH TO OCCUPY GERMANY

London, June 11.—(U.P.)—Gen. George S. Patton's famed Third and Lt. Gen. Alexander M. Patch's veteran Seventh will serve as occupation armies in the American zone of Germany, the army newspaper Stars and Stripes said today.

The 15th Army under Lt. Gen. Leonard Garmy, originally designated as the American Army of Occupation, will cease operations soon after the official boundaries of the occupation zones have been announced, Stars and Stripes said.

Thus the Third and Seventh armies will remain in much of the territory they conquered in the Ruhr and Rhineland, but these areas will be turned over to British and French occupation armies.

Stars and Stripes said the American zone would be divided into the districts. The Seventh Army will control the western district and the Third, the eastern.
