CHASING AROUND

My wife is pregnant for the first time at the age of 40 (writes a Saskatchewan reader.) I engaged one of the leading local physicians, but she didn't seem satisfied, as she thought she should be bigger by now and she imagined the baby didn't move enough. So I took her to another doctor for a double check. He examined her and said everything was normal so far as her size and movement of the baby were concerned but that she had high blood pressure and a trace of albumen in urine. He said he told her she should eat no meat, no eggs.

On the next visit to the first doctor, I asked him if meat causes high blood pressure, and he answered that this was a common but erroneous belief. He again assured us that everything is normal. My wife is now in the seventh month! What would you suggest, Dr. Brady.

The first doctor was right about it. Of course meat does not cause high blood pressure.

He was right, too, in NOT putting your wife on a diet, at least in not advising her to eat no meat, no eggs. The quaint old character who gave your wife that advice may be a huge success in putting himself over on the community but I'd hate to have any member of my family under his care.

There is no good reason why one with high blood pressure and albumen and casts in the urine or even a well developed chronic nephritis (chronic Bright's disease) should not eat a reasonable amount of meat, eggs, fowl, cheese, milk, fish. In fact the notion that meat, particularly "red" or dark meat (can beef) is in some way unsuitable for

persons with high blood pressure, chronic rheumatism, chronic Bright's disease, etc., seems to be one of those quaint old medical traditions for which there is no substantial foundation.

Although the correspondent does not mention it, the fact that his wife is 40 probably worries her too. That's a favorite theme for the popular song, popular with the old women of the neighborhood anyway. "The Expectancy Blues." It would do the poor girl no harm, may even give her a bit of confidence and good cheer, to read the chapter Her First at Forty in the booklet "Preparing for Maternity."

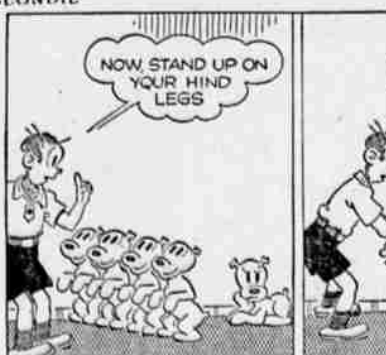

World Conference On News Freedom Urged By Editors

Washington, June 12—(U.P.)—A world conference in Australia on freedom of news was endorsed today by the American Society of Newspaper Editors on recommendation of three globe-encircling U. S. editorial leaders. The newspapermen reported yesterday to ASNE directors on their 40,000-mile tour during which they discussed freedom of the press and communications with most of the world's political and military leaders. They said they found many governments "controlling the press politically under the guise of war security," but that foreign editors also desired more press freedom than most nations have permitted.
