Trout and steelhead fishing in Rogue river has greatly improved over the past week, according to Al (Demon Fisherman) Piche, who tells piscatorial enthusiasts how and where to catch the red point savers. Fish are being taken in most parts of the river, he said. Excellent fishing is reported above McCloud where water is clear. Spinners and eggs are used on runs and holes, while some anglers have reported good catches with flies on the riffles. Shore fishing has been good with best spinner being a 50-50 size four or five.

Bait fishing at Diamond Lake is fair and is still holding up good on troll. Best results have been reported with either a big flasher with worms or a flasher with a bone fish or claw lure attached. Some Andy Reekers are also getting fish.

Angling is spotty at Fish Lake but fair catches are reported on flashers and worms. Roads are dried out but are rough the last six miles.

Bass are biting at Hyatt Lake and catfish are caught from shore. Roads are now reported passable, according to Piche. Emigrant Lake is good at the upper end for catfish with many rainbow also being taken. Occasionally a big bass is hooked with trolling producing more results than shore fishing.

All smaller streams are a choice to the angler with water conditions good. Bear Creek has yielded good catches on worms while the Klamath river, west of Keno, has been excellent on rainbows up to five pounds. Best results are on flies.
