

THIRD SPRAY DUE ON PEARS, APPLES

The third cover spray for the control of codling moth on pears and apples should be completed on June 25, according to C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent and L. G. Gentner, entomologist of the So. Oregon Experiment Station.

They recommend use of three pounds arsenate of lead, 1/4 pound Colloidal 77 and one quart stove oil per hundred gallons. Add to partially filled tank in order listed. With astringent

lead use 1/4 pound Multifilm instead of Colloidal 77. Where worms are a problem they advise using three pounds arsenate of lead, three quarts of summer oil and 1/4 pound of Colloidal 77 per hundred gallons. Use no Multifilm with astringent lead and oil. This spray is very important as the peak attack should start the last of this month.
