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## RELIEF FOR POLLINOSIS

Pollinosis is any condition, state or disease due to pollen. As explained in a preceding talk the popular name, hay fever, is wrong because fever is not characteristic of pollinosis and pollinosis is only rarely due to hay. Most cases occurring in the late summer or early autumn, at the season hay is harvested, are due, not to hay, and not to the conspicuous goldenrod of that season, but to the ubiquitous and unnoticed ragweed, pollen of which heavily pollutes the air, with the minute grains that appear under the microscope as burrs with prickly covering—well fitted to irritate linings of nose and throat and eyelids.

Pollinosis occurring in the spring or early summer is more likely to be due to the pollen of orchard grass, crab grass, blue grass or other grasses or to pigweed, oak tree, elm tree, white ash, curly dock or lamb's quarters.

We'll assume for the sake of bickering that you suffer in good faith from pollinosis and you are not just cultivating the trouble as a good excuse for a little trip or vacation. Where shall you go for the season you lucky stuff—I mean you poor thing? Well, there are many places more or less free from the pollens that cause most pollinosis. Coronado, Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz in California; New London, Litchfield Hills in Connecticut; Duluth in Minnesota; Two Rivers in Wisconsin; Bald Mountain, Georgia; Green Mountains, Vermont; Albuquerque, New Mexico; Salt Lake City.

# COURT REFUSES SEIZURE REVIEW

Washington, June 19—(U.P.)—The supreme court today refused to review the right of the federal government to seize private property to enforce War Labor Board orders granting maintenance of membership to labor unions.

It was the fourth time this term that the court declined to review WLB orders. The ruling was made on an appeal by the Humble Oil & Refining Co., Ingleside, Tenn., from a decision by the circuit court of appeals at New Orleans, La. The circuit court has dissolved a temporary injunction granted last September by the northern Texas district court at Dallas which restrained Fuel Administrator Harold L. Ickes from seizing the plant to enforce the WLB order.

# How To Get 6 Per-Cent

Babson Advises Certain Utility Stocks

Babson Park, Mass., June 15—(Special Correspondence)—Rich people may not now be interested in income from securities because they have to pay so much of it back to the government in taxes. The great mass of people, however, prefer to have their money well invested and paying good interest. Then they like to spend this interest and not disturb their principal. Hence, in the long run, the question of income is the basic factor in the stock and bond markets. This should be even more true later because next year, personal and corporation taxes will probably be reduced.

# PEOPLE SHOULD TAKE PROFITS

For the above reason, Wall Street has the saying: "Idle funds soon burn holes in peoples' pockets." Most people do not work and slave just to keep money idle. They want to see it work and earn so it will help support them. This will be all the more important when the cost of living goes up as it will after Japan collapses. In fact, this will be especially true of those who must live on the interest which they get from invested capital.

Most investors do not look at the price at which their bonds or stocks are selling; but only at the dividends which they get. They may have bought a six per cent stock for \$100 which has gone up to \$150; and hence, from a mathematical viewpoint, now yields only four per cent. Yet they refuse to sell it because the dividend is still \$6.00 per year. This stubbornness on the part of most investors may sometimes be a mistake. Certainly it is one reason why the market steadily goes up. The buyers are increasing, with few people willing to sell.

# HOW TO GET 6% ON INVESTMENT

Now your banker may tell you that the six per cent days have gone by and if you do sell six per cent can no longer be secured elsewhere with even fair safety. But I disagree with him. Some of the good public utilities still earn six per cent and should earn more after World War II is over and corporation taxes are reduced. Of course, you must hunt for them. Such investments do not "go begging," but you can get them if you insist.

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
