

HOMECOMING IKE GETS HUG, KISS FROM MOTHER, 83

Kansas City, Mo., June 21.—(U.P.) General of the Army Dwight D. Eisenhower received a homecoming son's welcome today, a hug and a kiss from his 83-year-old mother, Mrs. Ida Stover Eisenhower.

The general's five-starred plane eased onto the runway of the municipal airport at 12:16 p. m. (CWT) after circling the field and coming in to land from the southwest. It taxied back from the northern end to near the TWA building.

As the big ship rolled to a stop, motorcars carrying members of the general's family drove up. Eisenhower saluted as he stepped out, then grinned broadly as he spied his mother. "Hello mom," he called out. "How are you feeling?"

"The same old way, son," she replied as she hugged him to her bosom and smothered him with kisses.

To his wife, Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower, Ike called out: "Hello, darling, I'm sure glad to see you again."

The general's wife had come to Kansas City ahead of him by

train for this, her third meeting of the week with him. Also with Eisenhower was his son, Lt. John S. Eisenhower, and his aides.

As photographers swarmed around the family near the C-54, Ike yoo-hooed at his brothers, Arthur B., Milton S., Edgar, and Early. It was the first such family get-together in nearly a score of years.

New York, June 21.—(U.P.)—Liquor shares, rails and the steels led an advance in the stock market today to a new high for more than eight years. Listed bonds reached their highest general level in more

than 80 years. Grains snapped back.

Demand for liquor shares reflected an assertion by the Allied Liquor Industries, Inc., that a "sizeable" amount of bourbon will be produced in the next "holiday" beginning July 1, since distillers had bought a substantial volume of corn prior to the prohibition against such use of corn issued June 11 by the WFA.

Preliminary closing Dow-Jones averages: Industrials, 168.14, up 0.40; rail, 62.84, up 0.74; utility, 33.02, up 0.30; and 65 stocks, 65.27, up 0.38.

Sales were 2,100,000, the most for any full session since last April 16 and compared with 1,680,000 yesterday.




