URIC ACID MY EYE

A woman aged seventy has all but two of her own teeth. A recent X-ray by her dentist shows, she says, that she has a tendency to uric acid in her system, which, if not cleared up, will affect her teeth seriously, also her eyesight — presumably this is what the dentist told her. She does not wear glasses at present. Now just what changes should she make in her diet. It seems that in sounding off in my quick way here recently I boasted that I have had more experience than any honest doctor in the country in long distance diagnosis and absent treatment, or something to that effect, so it should be child's play for me to set the correspondent and her dentist right about this case.

I do talk myself into situations. I can't dig up the copy without a tedious search through the files, than which I can conceive of nothing more odious — unless it is reading clippings from my own column — but I'm willing to bet you ten to one — any amount up to a dime — that when I uttered that remark about long distance diagnosis and absent treatment I was trying to make the reader realize the absurdity of any attempt or pretense of ability to make a diagnosis of, or to prescribe treatment for any individual condition without having examined the patient.

According to the medical authorities X-ray pictures of what medical authorities call "gouty arthritis" show typical "punched-out" appearances about the joint involved. But speaking now as the old one-horse country practitioner I repeat I'm from Missouri in respect to several

fine old medical traditions, and particularly these three:
1. That any illness is caused by cold, dampness, exposure, sudden change, draft.
2. That rabies occurs in man.
3. That excess of uric acid or deposits of monosodium urate in the tissues or about joints is the cause of a disease called "gout."
The correspondent asks whether I think what she describes is serious and if so whether I advise a change in her diet.
After all, she doesn't describe anything — so I don't believe it is serious. The only change I would advise in her diet, if any, is an increase in the daily consumption of these foods:

Milk, cheese, egg yolk, vegetables, raw and cooked, greens, peanuts and nuts, and if necessary a decrease in the daily consumption of these:
White flour and things made of it. Refined sugar and syrup and things made of them.

LEGAL LOOPHOLE FREES ACCUSED

Los Angeles, June 21 — (U.P.) — Two convicted gasoline coupon counterfeiters under indictment on a second counterfeiting charge today won back their freedom and 100,000 half-finished ration coupons and printing presses.

Federal Judge Ralph E. Jenney dismissed the second case against Jesse M. Carney and Milton G. Ramsey and ordered their equipment returned on grounds the search warrant by which federal investigators entered their home was not legally sufficient.

Affidavits on which the warrants were based were "not strong enough legally to justify the search and seizure," the judge ruled.
Ramsey, 42, and Carney, 40, free on \$7500 bond each pending appeal from three-year prison sentences for an earlier counterfeiting conviction, were indicted last April when investigators raided their rented cottage in the Hollywood hills and found the partly-completed coupons and printing equipment.

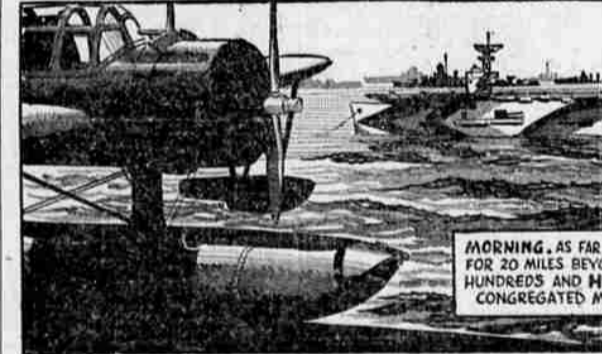

Vast Nazi Hoard Found In Vaults Of Regensburg By U.S. Third Army

Paris, June 2 — (U.P.) — Troops of the U. S. 3rd Army have found in Regensburg bank vaults a Nazi hoard of gold, silver, jewelry, and securities valued tentatively at more than \$5,000,000, 000, it was announced today.

The treasure was believed to represent the main national wealth of Austria and of Bavaria, looted by the Nazis in a systematic campaign.

First Lt. John J. Stack, Jr., San Francisco, fiscal officer for the 12th corps local military government detachment, found the hoard in the vaults of the Regensburg Reichsbank.

It included loot known to have been taken from the death camp victims at Dachau and Buchenwald. There were suitcases and boxes of watches, bracelets and other jewelry, in addition to 2-200 pounds of silver bullion melted down from jewelry.

First estimates of the value of the treasure placed it far in excess of the gold cache found in a Merken salt mine this spring.

The announcement of the find did not say when it was made. What was described officially as the main national wealth of Austria, included foreign securities valued at \$3,000,000,000. The Bavarian lot included domestic German securities valued at \$2,000,000,000.

The loot included a solid gold tabernacle from the Russian Orthodox church at Prague. There also was \$50,000 to \$100,000 worth of gold and silver coins and 15 bars of gold bullion valued at \$300,000.

The announcement also said troops of the 12th corps found a cache of pure gold valued at \$5,000 on a hay wagon near Haldhausen, Austria.
