AMINO ACIDS

The necessity for Amino Acids in the diet has been discussed. There are at least twenty-one recognized. Of these at least four are considered indispensable. That is, the body cannot make them itself out of other Amino Acids. The Amino Acids must come from protein food. In fact, the Amino Acids are the unit structures out of which proteins are built. So the food value of protein depends upon its content of Amino Acids. Some proteins contain only four or five different Amino Acids, while others contain a large number. The different organs vary as to their Amino Acid requirement. Lean meat, fish, milk, cheese and eggs are usually considered as sources for complete proteins. The Amino Acid deficiency of peanuts may be made up by the protein of wheat. Peas and navy beans are a good source, but are incomplete, while the soy bean is considered a complete protein food.
