PRACTICE LIMITED TO PROPHYLAXIS

Prophylaxis (pro-fil-ax-is), says Webster, is the art of preventing disease.



A doctor recently returned from several years of military service tells me he has been trying to practice preventive medicine exclusively and so far there have been enough people, and the indications are that the number will increase as his specialty becomes better recognized, willing to pay for such service. These people seem pleased to find a diagnostician who is willing and able to make a complete general examination and conduct such laboratory tests as he considers necessary in the individual circumstances—not just a blind and needless expensive application of a routine series of tests. But the doctor is now uncertain how to present himself to the profession and the public, just what to call his specialty. He asks for my opinion.

Besides conducting such general examinations as you describe, this special field of practice, whether it is designated as Personal Health or Preventive Medicine or Prophylaxis, and the practitioner a prophylactician, would naturally include immunizing against epidemic diseases, nutritional problems, personal hygiene, determination of fitness for marriage and advice to patients contemplating marriage or divorce, determination of which, if either, partner is responsible for childlessness, dealing with abnormalities or deficiencies of development or growth in infants, young children and youths of teen age.

John Doe, M.D., D.P.M., would be the expert technical consultant to whom the physical education program in the public school might be submitted for approval. Of course there is no such degree as Doctor of Preven-

tive Medicine at present—but let's pretend the medical Nazis now in the saddle have been liquidated and American Medicine has regained a measure of dignity.

When the prophylactician formally announces practice limited to preventive medicine and personal health, no matter how meticulous his professional or ethical conduct may be, he will be more or less resented by every physician or specialist in the community, for, after all, most of them must expect to lose some patients to him even if they are too small to refer them as the better physicians and specialists refer patients in everyday practice. And so, I should imagine, the pioneer specialist in preventive medicine or personal health should assure himself enough capital to support him for three to five years before he ventures into this exclusive field of practice. In the first five years he will have ample time to cultivate relations with schools, clubs, youth organizations, and the like and to accept invitations to address lunch clubs, conventions, forums—all of which provide opportunities for people more conscious of the importance and value of prophylaxis.

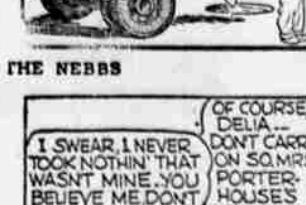

91ST CONTRIBUTES TO MEMORIAL FOR FALLEN COMRADES

With the Fifth Army, Italy—To perpetuate the memory of comrades who fought beside them and died in the long, bitter struggle to liberate Italy, officers and men of the 361st infantry regiment, 91st "Powder River" Division, have contributed almost \$4,500 to erect a monument to their gallant sacrifices here.

The project was suggested by Colonel R. W. Broedlow of Medford, Oregon, regimental commander. Speaking informally to his men after the close of the Fifth Army's campaign in Italy, Broedlow said an appropriate place to erect the monument might be near Livernano, where, in four days of bloody fighting, doughboys of the 361st destroyed a heavily fortified enemy defense line that the Germans had been ordered to hold at all costs.

He emphasized, however, that the final decision as to the type of monument and its location will rest entirely with the men of the regiment.
Major Roy J. Wagner, Oakland, Calif., regimental staff officer, is organizing a committee to formulate plans and to choose a design for the proposed memorial.
