New York, June 28—(U.P.)—The Associated Press will petition the supreme court for a re-hearing of its recent affirmation of a special court's anti-trust law decision against the news agency

and in event the petition is denied will amend its by-laws to conform with the ruling, the AP's board of directors announced last night. The board said it did not feel the AP was the appropriate agency to appeal to congress for relief from the court decision, but said its decision should not deter members from exercising their right of petition. New York, June 28—(U.P.)—The narrowing gap between collegiate and improving high school athletes was illustrated today as eight scholastic runners were placed among the seeded stars for the National AAU track and field championships at Randall's Island this week-end.

Despite an impressive array of college and service athletes, the schoolboys took eight seeded berths in seven event of Friday's junior championships—open to all comers who never have won a National title. They also placed two speedsters in the senior championships scheduled for Saturday.

Rated equal with their collegiate competition in the seniors were Pery Samuels and August Erfurth, both San Antonio, Tex., high school boys. Samuels turned in a 9.5 clocking fastest of the year for the 100-yard dash.

foothill oval's 40-day spring meeting, include Old English, Paperboy, Brie a Bac, Autocrat, Lou-Bre, Broadcloth, Triplicate, Texas Sandman and Best Effort, with Sirde a probable.

TRAIL BLAZERS

Imperishable history was being written in the West 140 years ago this month by two courageous young men—Captains Meriwether Lewis and William Clark.

On their trail-blazing journey to the Pacific they sought, but failed to find, a pass through the Rocky Mountains in northern Montana.

That elusive gateway through the mountains was discovered 83 years later when Great Northern Railway was advancing westward. Through now-famous Marias Pass the railway's trains cross the Continental Divide less than a mile above sea level.

The pioneering services of Captains Lewis and Clark have been commemorated by a monument which stands along the steel trail of the Empire Builder near Meriwether, Montana.

A trail blazer in its own right, the railway joins the American Pioneer Trails Association in observing the 140th anniversary of the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

A sprinkler with an opening 3/4 inch wide, running at full pressure will use 300 gallons of water an hour. This will cover a lawn or garden space of 2500 sq. ft. with 12 tons of water in ten hours, the equivalent of one inch of rainfall. In extremely hot weather this is enough sprinkling for one week—50 tons of water a month. In cool weather sprinkle less often. If a sprinkler runs over two hours every day, it is water wasted.
