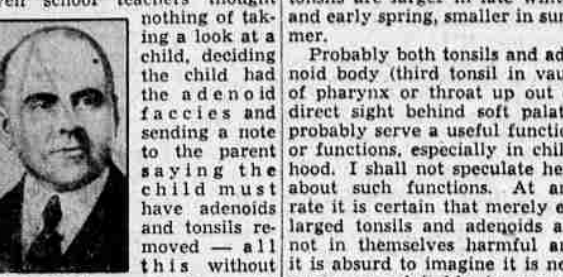

TONSILS—THEN AND NOW



Some readers may remember the time when doctors, nurses, even school teachers thought nothing of taking a look at a child, deciding the child had the adenoid facies and sending a note to the parent saying the child must have adenoids and tonsils re- moved—all this without even a pretense of proper medical examina- tion, that is, without having seen the adenoid in the throat mirror or felt the mass with the examining finger. Thousands of chil- dren who were inattentive, dull, backward in school, whether from congenital or inherent mental deficiency, unrecognized disease or malnutrition, were subjected to operations which were largely unjustified, back in the early years of the century when the tonsil and adenoid oper- ation was the great surgical fad. I flatter myself that I made some of my best enemies in the medical profession by calling public attention to some of the more shameful abuses in that field and creating in the popular mind a wee doubt of the reli- ability of the doctor who con- demns a child to the guillotine and snare on the basis of a mere look at the child's large tonsils.

Large tonsils are normal in healthy children, and there is no ground for subjecting the child to the risk of general anesthesia to remove them, except in rare instances when breathing is seri- ously obstructed or the hearing

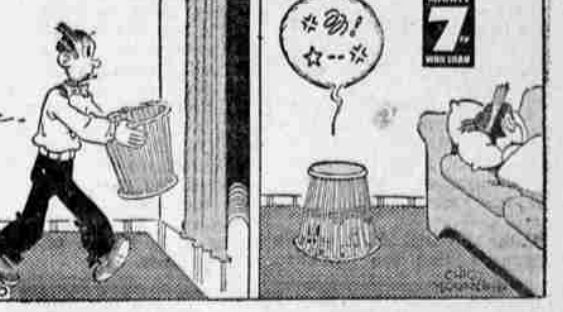
