Game Goes for Three Extra Innings; Littrell Parts Downs Ordnance Shop.

NELSON LEADS BY UNDER PAR GOLF

Chicago, June 30—(U.P.)—Byron Nelson, playing the cool, mechanical golf which made him the game's leading money winner, took over first place in the 72-hole victory national open today when he fired a four-under-par 68 on his second round for a 38-hole score of 137, seven-under-par.

Nelson's drives were frequently off and he had to scramble in the rough and sand, but he used his irons brilliantly to knit together five birdies, 12 pars and one bogey to go with the 69 he shot yesterday and to put him into the top spot for the final 36 holes tomorrow.

The Toledo, O., money man finished ahead of a sweeping wind and rain storm which raised havoc with Ky Laffoon, who entered today's round tied with defending champion Harold (Jug) McSpaden at 68 strokes.

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THUMBS UP WINS ANITA HANDICAP; SANDMAN SECOND

Arcadia, Cal., June 30—(U.P.)—Thumbs Up, Louis B. Mayer's sturdy six-year-old, rewarded a screaming crowd of 55,000 today by galloping to victory in the \$100,000 Santa Anita handicap by a head.

Thumbs Up tied Sea Biscuit's record for the mile and a quarter at 2:01 1/5. Texas Sandman was second, and Gay Dalton, the Mexican champion, thrilled the crowd by coming from last to finish third.

Jockey Johnny Longden brought the even-odds favorite up fast, running second to Stronghold as the 13 horse field rounded the first turn.

Longden had the son of Blenheim II and Gas Bag well in hand as they passed the half way mark. Thumbs Up dropped back as Texas Sandman and Lou-Bre, Charles S. Howard's bid for a third hundred grand winner, set the pace.

Thumbs Up, with Longden starting to use the whip, moved back into competition on the far turn and took the lead as they hit the stretch.

At this point, Gay Dalton, the cinderella horse, who had been a disappointment in two previous appearances here, made his move and the crowd took up the roar as the five-year-old from south of the border started eating up ground. The gay one moved up between horses, but Thumbs Up, speeding past Texas Sandman, held his lead and won going away. Gay Dalton didn't have enough left to overtake the second place horse.

Skipper Forecasts Winged Sailboats

Long Beach Calif. (U.P.)—A veteran Pacific skipper, Capt. Thomas Keeney, predicts that tomorrow's sailboats will sprout wings.

Keeney, also an inventor, has planned use of airfoils on masts of a vessel for rigid sails. He claims the wings take advantage of every current, have a tendency to stabilize the vessel, can sail closer to the wind and do away with standing and running rigging.

Capt. Keeney says British ship operators were anxious to find something like this before the war when the Board of Trade had in preparation a law obliging every vessel under 4,000 tons to carry emergency sails.

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HOLMES HITS IN 26 GAMES IN ROW AS BOSTON WINS

New York, June 30—(U.P.)—Tommy Holmes of the Boston Braves continued his one-man batting show today when he collected a home run, triple and single as the Braves beat the St. Louis Cards, 8 to 4.

It was the 26th straight game in which the Brooklyn-born Brave outfielder has hit safely, and his three hits in three times up—in which he drove four runs home—lifted his batting average to .393, some 30 percentage points above his closest competition.

However, Holmes had to be spectacular today to wrest honors from teammate Wietelmann, who cracked out a three-run homer.

Hy Vandenberg was wild but effective in the clutch as he pitched the Chicago Cubs to a 5 to 3 decision over the New York Giants. He allowed only five hits, but passed six Giants on walks and hit two batsmen. His control returned with men on base and 11 Giants were stranded. A three-run fifth inning won the game for Chicago.

Ben Chapman's debut as manager of the Philadelphia Phillies was not a gala event from the Philly point of view, although the Cincinnati Reds enjoyed it hugely. The Reds thumped Schanz and Barrett for nine runs in the seventh inning and went on to a 13 to 5 victory.

SLATE SPELLMAN FOR PAPAL POST

Rome, June 30—(U.P.)—Arch-bishop Francis J. Spellman of New York is the undisputed nominee for the next papal secretary of state and almost certainly will be appointed during the next consistory, scheduled in mid-December, sources close to the Vatican told the United Press today.

Spellman has literally no competition for the post, Vatican circles said. Advisors were said to be generally agreed that a non-Italian, particularly an American or a Briton, should be named.

PANAMA-FRANCO RELATIONS CEASE

Panama City, June 30—(U.P.)—The republic of Panama broke off diplomatic relations today with the Spanish government of Generalissimo Francisco Franco.

A decree issued by President Enrique A. Jimenez said the break was made because the foreign policy of the Franco government is considered contrary to the interests of the United Nations and to democratic prin-

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cles, "for which the United Nations are fighting to the death."
