FEDERAL SPENDING HITS NEW CEILING

Washington, July 5.—(U.P.)—The government spent a record \$100,030,000,000 during the fiscal year 1945 just closed, the treasury's official statement on spending activities for the year disclosed today.

The statement also disclosed new records in several departments. The treasury, as a result of the seventh war loan drive, the largest of all time, wound up the year with a record cash balance of nearly \$25,000,000,000. Net receipts in the fiscal year 1945 reached an all time high of \$46,457,000,000, an increase of \$2,308,000,000 over the previous fiscal year.

Total budgetary expenditures were \$6,661,000,000 higher than in the 1944 fiscal year. The deficit, also reaching a new high amounted to \$53,948,000,000, an increase of \$4,353,000,000.
