

Craters Set For Crucial League Game Under Arcs

Medford Craters face one of the toughest games of the Southern Oregon league tomorrow night at 9 o'clock at the Fairgrounds park when they clash with Klamath Falls Marine Baracks nine.

Marines dropped an 8-7 count to Klamath Navy while the Navy stopped Medford 7 to 3 last Sunday. The game, first under the lights of the local season, will be a make-up of a contest postponed June 10 and will mark the first appearance of the leathernecks in the valley.

Manager Paul Freer has sin-

gled out George Barr, with one win and no defeats to his credit, to start on the mound for the Craters. Barr has been bothered with a sore arm since start of the season but now has the flipper in good shape and will be out after his second straight victory.

Freer said Steve Crippen, veteran first sacker and pitcher, will also be in the lineup. A big shakeup in the Crater batting order and lineup is being made to enable the Craters to bunch hitting power which was woefully weak against the Navy.

George Gitzen, who has been catching all season, may be shifted to the outfield with Freer working behind the plate. Crippen will probably start on first base, Freddie Stammen on second, Harold Lange at third base, Al Kircher at shortstop and Herb Burnham and Dick Babb with Gitzen in the outfield. Burnham leads his team's batting average with .500.

Sunday the Marines will play Central Point Studs at Central Point, Navy plays at Butte Falls and Medford travels to Ashland. All Sunday games start at 2:30 p. m.

Freer said Doug "Red" Davis, unbeaten this season, will probably get called to the mound against Ashland with Dick Kidwell on hand to back him up.

Trout fishing in smaller streams has turned to the upper reaches where water is cooler and food less. Small spinners are good as well as eggs in medium color. Flies have been the number one lure in whatever pattern and size the fisherman can obtain. Due to shortage of experienced help and lack of material the fly situation is serious at present. Fly stocks in Medford are reported scarce.

Hiatt Lake is providing excellent fishing with plenty of catches being made from either boat or shore. Crappies are easily taken on hooks with red yarn or piece of white fish meat. Reports from Diamond Lake are both good and bad. Some anglers reported fair catches while others caught nothing but a sunburn. Floating algae makes trolling anything but pleasant. Bait fishing brings best results and bigger fish. August to end of the season is said to be the best time to fish Diamond Lake.

TEX OLIVER TO RESUME DUTIES AS HEAD COACH

Eugene, Ore., July 6.—(U.P.)—Coach G. A. (Tex) Oliver has checked-in his lieutenant commander's uniform and will return to Eugene in civvies next week to get ready for the University of Oregon's first football team since 1942.

Oliver took a leave of absence in 1941 to enter the navy's physical fitness program and the Webfoots fielded only one more team under Acting Coach John Warren. Now that northwest schools are getting back on the football bandwagon, Oliver has received an over-age discharge and will pick up his two-year Oregon contract.

Duties Vary
Oliver had varied duties with the navy, including the head coach assignment at St. Mary's Pre-Flight school at Moraga, Cal., during the 1942 season, then was assigned to the Atlantic fleet wing in charge of physical fitness throughout the Atlantic area.

He recently transferred to the Pacific fleet wing and coached the Navy All-Star team which

defeated the Army All-Stars in the Hawaiian Islands last season. Oregon is getting not only Oliver back from the wars but also Head Basketball and Baseball Coach Howard A. Hobson, who was on sabbatical leave and later accepted a civilian assignment in Europe with the army, conducting training courses in coaching for army officers. Oliver also is expected to have the help of Bob Officer, a navy chief specialist who was a trainer at Oregon and acted as trainer for Oliver's air divets at St. Mary's. He is stationed at Chapel Hill and hopes to get his release this summer.

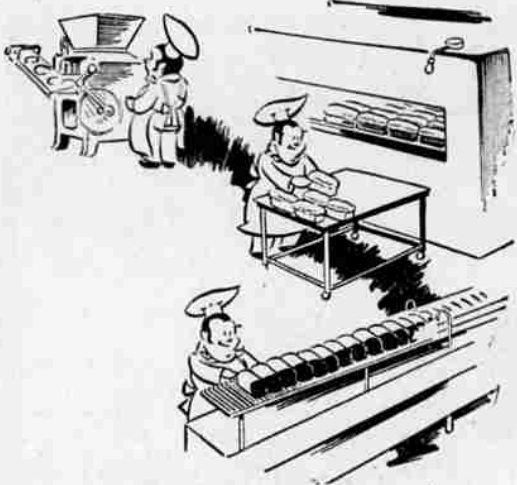
Trojans Hold Workout

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TENNIS PLAYERS IN SEMI-FINALS

River Forest, Ill., July 6.—(U.P.)—Top-seeded contestants advanced to the semifinals in the national clay court tennis tournament today in a round marked by the absence of Jack McManis, San Diego.

McManis, fourth seeded star of the tourney who ranks ninth nationally, was eliminated in a slight upset game yesterday by Lt. Hal Surface, Jr., of Berry Field, Nashville, Tenn. Surface, home from a tour in India, launched a big drive to regain his pre-war tennis standing by defeating the west coast player in straight sets, 6-3, 6-0, 8-6.

First-seeded William Talbert, Wilmington, Del., who ranks No. 2 in the national ratings, will meet Surface in today's semifinal round, provided he defeats Bernard Bartzan, San Angelo, Tex., in an early afternoon match.

Defending Champion Francisco (Pancho) Segura's semifinal opponent will be Elwood Cooke of Los Angeles, a former clay court favorite who has been in the army.
