NOVIKOFF PROBE IS REQUESTED BY CHICAGO WRITER

Chicago, July 6.—(U.P.)—The Daily News today asked Sen. A. B. (Happy) Chandler, commissioner of baseball, to investigate the "Lou Novikoff deal" by which the Chicago Cubs keep their "Los Angeles" farm club at a time when the White Sox are offering \$15,000 for him.

The paper printed on a three column head on its sport page a letter written by its veteran baseball writer, Jack Ryan, and addressed to the Kentucky senator in Washington. The letter asked:

"Some people, commissioner, wonder if this is the way you want baseball to trample on a player's job prospects and earning power?"

The White Sox are ready to pay \$15,000 or more for Novikoff, former Cub outfielder, the News said.

Mrs. Grace Comiskey, owner, and Manager Jim Dykes of the Sox wired their offer to the Los Angeles club, controlled by Owner P. K. Wrigley and General Manager James Gallagher of the Cubs. They were flatly refused, the paper said.

"There was some sleight-of-hand work, of course, in dumping Novikoff into the minors" for the third time, the News said.

ASHLAND LIBEREE ENJOYS FURLOUGH

Released from a German prison camp in the last days of the war in Europe, Pfc. Ralph Gillmore arrived in the valley Monday to spend a 65-day furlough with his wife, the former Mary Alice Johnson, of Medford and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Gillmore of Ashland.

On expiration of his furlough, Pfc. Gillmore will report to Santa Barbara, Calif., for further assignment with the army.

Pfc. Gillmore was decorated missing in action last December 16, and states that he became a prisoner of war Dec. 21. During his months of internment, Gillmore says he was unkindly treated. He was moved about to three or four different camps before being sent to a prison camp near Dresden. He reports

that he had sufficient food although there was little variety in the menu.

Gillmore was graduated from Ashland high school with the class of 1941.

Run over by a farm wagon loaded with hay Tuesday evening, G. C. Glass of route 2, box 412-3, is confined in Sacred Heart hospital with a fractured pelvis. His attending physician stated today that his condition is satisfactory.

The accident occurred between 6:30 and 7 p. m. Tuesday when a team of horses, driven by Glass' son, began to run from the spot where Glass was pitching hay onto the wagon. Making an attempt to grasp the bridle, the victim was knocked down by the horse and the wagon wheel passed over his body. He was taken to the hospital in the Conger-Morris ambulance.
