

POSTAL PAY BILL INKED BY TRUMAN

Washington, July 6—(U.P.)—President Truman today signed legislation granting an average basic salary increase of \$400 a year to the 300,000 postal employees.

It is the first basic pay raise the postal employees have had since 1925. The increases generally are in line with the "little steel" formula limiting wartime wage increases.

The act will raise the total

basic pay-roll for postal workers by about \$150,000,000 a year. The postal employees received a temporary war-time increase of \$300 a year each, but this temporary raise now will be cancelled. The new rates are retro-active to July 1.

JAP ADMIRALS DIE
San Francisco, July 6—(U.P.)—The Domei news agency today reported the deaths of four more Japanese admirals. The dispatch, recorded by the FCC, said that the deaths were announced by the Sasebo naval station. The men were Vice Admiral Katsukiyo Shinoda and Rear Admirals Gosaburo Nogiuchi, Uroku Rashimoto and Kirezo Yamauchi.

BUTTER \$188 ON BERLIN MARKET

London, July 6—(U.P.)—A Berlin dispatch to the Daily Express said today that the price of butter on the black market in the German capital is \$188 a pound.

Sugar is \$30 a pound, dried peas \$15, bread \$10, coffee \$140, and tea \$190.

The dispatch said the kingpin of the Berlin black market is a "scoundrelly anti-Nazi" fellow called George.

"I can get you anything you want, but you will have to pay for it," George told the Daily Express correspondent. "English cigarettes, even—but they will cost you \$4 apiece."

Some other typical black market prices were quoted as cigars, \$5 each; a man's suit \$1,000 to \$1,200; a pair of bad ersatz leather shoes \$280 and a cake of soap \$30.

Goodyear Workers Return to Jobs As Navy Takes Over

Akron, O., July 6—(U.P.)—Approximately 83 per cent of the first shift workers reported to work today under navy supervision at the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., which has been closed by a strike until President Truman's seizure order yesterday.

Capt. H. J. Clark, navy officer in charge, said he was "extremely pleased" by the response of United Rubber Workers (CIO) to his directive to resume production. He said it was the highest percentage of returnees on a first shift by any plant seized by the government.

"The Voice" Home From Tour For USO

New York, July 6—(U.P.)—Frank Sinatra returned to the United States today after a six-week USO tour of the Mediterranean.

The singer and four other members of his troupe, arrived at LaGuardia field on an air transport command plane from Casablanca. Sinatra said he was tired and would rest for several days at the Hotel Waldorf-Astoria.

ARNOLD MENTIONED AS SUCCESSOR TO ROBERTS

Washington, July 6—(U.P.)—The retirement of Associate Justice Owen J. Roberts, the supreme court's leading dissenter,

brought speculation today that President Truman may choose a westerner to succeed him.

The president, who announced yesterday that Roberts would retire July 31, gave no hint as to his successor. One possible candidate mentioned for Roberts' court post is Thurman W. Arnold, who resigned yesterday from the U. S. court of appeals. Arnold is a native of Wyoming.

MEAT RATIONING TO RETURN TO CANADA

Ottawa, July 6—(U.P.)—Meat rationing will be resumed in Canada as soon as the wartime prices and trade board completes necessary arrangements, Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced today.

DOCTOR MUST MOVE

Hollywood, July 6—(U.P.)—Dr. Edwin Glass, San Francisco and Los Angeles gland specialist, today was under court order to move out of his 20-room Laurel Canyon home by nightfall and to pay his blond wife, Irene, \$600 a month pending trial of her suit for divorce. Mrs. Glass, who will continue to live in the home, charged Glass "swears and threatens us with knives and a gun."

MORE FREIGHT

Washington, July 6—(U.P.)—Loadings of revenue freight in the week ended June 30 totaled 893,741 cars, the most since the week ended April 28, the Association of American Railroads disclosed today.
