

Cubs Lose To Cross-Town Rivals In Charity Game

New York, July 10—(U.P.)—The 10-game winning streak of the Chicago Cubs was broken today in the best possible way—where it didn't count in the National league standings—in a 10-inning, 5 to 4 loss to the cross-town White Sox in a war-charity game.

The White Sox victory, at Comiskey park, highlighted a program of three inter-league night games for the benefit of war charities. Wally Moses hit a homer for the Sox in the seventh and scored the winning run in the 10th on a single by John Dickshot. Relief Pitcher Earl Caldwell, holding the Cubs to one hit in six innings, was the

winner over Paul Derringer. At New York, the Yankees put on a six-run rally in the third to beat the Giants, 7 to 1, at the Polo grounds. Ernie Bonham gained the victory which was insured in the big inning by Hershel Martin's grand-slam homer. The game was called after seven innings because of rain. Sen. A. B. (Happy) Chandler, making his first appearance as baseball commissioner at the polo grounds, threw out the first ball.

Dave Ferriss Will Pitch Left-Handed In Charity Contest

Boston, July 10—(U.P.)—Rookie Right-hander Dave Ferriss, who has won 14 games and lost two for the Boston Red Sox this season, is going to use a "secret weapon" today when he meets the Braves in a war charities game. He is going to pitch left handed.

Ferriss, who is ambidextrous, has been warming up as a left hander lately, but lacks the control to become a southpaw suddenly in a league game. He thinks, however, that eventually he may develop his left handed pitching to such an extent that he can be his own relief hurler.

The game will match Ferriss, leading pitcher in the Majors against Tommy Holmes of the Braves, who paces both circuits in hitting with a .407 mark as of the latest official weekly averages.

Los Angeles, July 10—(U.P.)—Lou Novikoff, fence-busting outfielder of the floundering Los Angeles, said today he will be inducted into the army Wednesday at Fort MacArthur, Calif.

Novikoff, who has an invalid wife and two children, said state selective service officials had rejected his appeal for deferment.

Induction of the right-handed slugger, who came to the Angels this season after three years with the Chicago Cubs, would end attempts to return Novikoff to the Major leagues. The Chicago Daily News last week charged the player was "dumped" into the Chicago Cubs' Pacific Coast league farm club while the Chicago White Sox offered \$15,000 for him.

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DENNY SHUTE IS AHEAD OF FIELD IN PGA TOURNEY

Dayton, O., July 10—(U.P.)—Dapper Denny Shute of Akron, O., striving to keep alive one of golf's grittiest comebacks, goes out for a new record today as the big push gets under way in the final qualifying round of the P.G.A. national tournament.

Forgotten except for memories of his 1936 and 1937 P.G.A. championships and his 1933 victory in the British open, Shute exploded out of nowhere yesterday when he blazed a five-under-par 67 over the Moraine Country club course to take a one-stroke lead going into the last 18 holes of the 36-hole qualifying play.

Today he tries for a new P.G.A. qualifying record, needing a 68 to beat the present mark of 136 strokes set by Fred Morrison in 1929 and tied by Frank Moore in 1938.

Hot on his heels going into this last 18 qualifying holes are a foursome of stars like himself, almost forgotten in the recent splurges of such "modern" professionals as Byron Nelson and Harold (Jug) McSpaden.

Hunting Seasons To be Discussed

The 1945 hunting seasons, bag limits and other regulations affecting large and small game will come up for consideration when the Oregon State Game Commission holds its annual hearing for this purpose at 10 a. m. Saturday at its Portland offices.

TOO MUCH GAS TO CIVILIAN DRIVERS

Washington, July 10—(U.P.)—The Office of Price Administration has launched a nationwide campaign to stop over-issuance of gasoline coupons by local rationing boards.

The agency is concerned because consumption of gasoline by civilian motorists has risen steadily in the last few months. It has reached the point where the value of outstanding coupons is more than the total amount of gasoline set aside for civilian use.

Officials said the over-issuance of stamps last month totaled 100,000 gallons a day.

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DISCONTINUANCE OF SHORT OVER-NIGHT PULLMAN SERVICE AFFECTS . . .

But It Means More Sleeping Cars for Veterans

Operation of overnight sleeping cars between Southern Oregon and Portland will be discontinued Sunday, July 15th, by order of the United States Office of Defense Transportation.

The new regulations eliminate all Pullman sleeping cars operating for a distance of 450 miles or less.

The reason for this Order is that additional sleeping cars MUST be obtained to provide accommodations for the returning veterans from Europe, who are reaching Atlantic ports in large numbers. These veterans are coming home for discharge, or for furlough, before going on to fight again in the Pacific. They deserve the most comfortable transportation service we can give them.

No new sleeping cars have been built since Pearl Harbor. Over one-half of the sleeping cars have been in exclusive use by the Military, but they are not enough for this new task. The O.D.T. Order resulted.

While discontinuance of short-distance sleeping car operations will cause inconvenience to many people, we feel sure that the citizens of Southern Oregon will approve this effort to better serve the men from overseas to whom we owe so much. We KNOW the families of these Southern Oregon boys who are coming home, will have no question as to the merit of this new regulation.

As far as the Southern Pacific is concerned, our guiding principle has been "The Military Comes First!" and we are cooperating 100% in carrying out the provisions of the above O.D.T. Order. With nearly 20,000 Southern Pacific men and women in the armed forces, we, too, have a real and personal interest in the welfare and comfort of service men and women.

So you may know how this order applies to Southern Pacific service generally, we show below Southern Pacific sleeping car service on our lines which will be discontinued after the last trip July 14th. Coach service will still be available between these points.
