

RED CROSS MEET WILL HEAR MEN FROM OVERSEAS

"Red Cross on the War Fronts" will be main theme of the program for the annual open meeting of Jackson county Red Cross chapter to be held Thursday noon at the court house. The short but interesting program has been arranged by Mrs. Marrs Gibbons, general chairman, and Mrs. John Young, program chairman.

So that Red Cross members can learn first hand what services the Red Cross has rendered overseas in hospital, field and prison camps, four speakers with actual experience have been secured. Major Kenneth N. Hyatt of the Army Medical corps, now stationed at Camp White, and Lt. Daniel Claassen, U. S. N., a newly arrived medical officer for the Camp White hospital, will give short talks on Red Cross services in the hospitals of the army and navy. Lt. Boyd Bellamy, recently returned from Stalag Luft 3 prison camp in Germany, and Pfc. Rodney A. Witham, who took part in the forced march of prisoners of war into the interior of Germany, will talk on the services rendered to prisoners of war camps.

Seth Bullis, Jackson county chapter chairman, will preside at the meeting at which one-third of the board members will be elected, according to the by-laws adopted.

The different corps members will be in their colorful uniforms and their respective tables will be decorated appropriately. Chairmen and representatives of the 42 production committees in the county and the six surgical dressing units which finished their work early in the year, will have tables of their own, as well as committee members, board members and the interested general public.

Reservations for the luncheon must be made by 5 p. m. July 16 by telephoning 4405, the Red Cross office.

No reservations are needed to attend the public meeting which will start about 1 p. m. Since this is the first luncheon meeting the Red Cross has ever held in the court house, which has been newly decorated and is cool during the hottest weather, a good attendance is expected. As the size of the auditorium will limit attendance at the luncheon, reservations should be in early, the chairman stated. The luncheon will be 75 cents a plate and will be served at 12 noon by Paul Bulken, caterer.

MINERS ORGANIZE AND NAME DOVER TEMPORARY HEAD

Floyd K. Dover of Rogue River was named temporary president of the Jackson County Mining Association at an organization meeting of the miners of Jackson county held Friday evening in the offices of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. More than 50 miners attended.

Other temporary officers selected were H. P. McDonald, Jr., of Trall, vice-president, and Charles Ray of Medford, secretary-treasurer. President Dover named a committee composed of Emerson Merrick, Don Stansell, Ted Harlan, and W. W. Truax, to draw up a constitution and by laws, to be presented at the next meeting, the meeting to be called by Dover. Les Childs, a director of the Western Mining Council, who lives at Grants Pass, was asked to serve on the committee as an advisor, as he is familiar with functions of the parent group.

Questions answered The meeting, arranged by the Western Mining Council and the mining committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, was thrown open to questions from miners concerning recent developments in the mining industry, and recent relaxations of regulations relative to securing materials for mining. Gus Walker, president of the Siskiyou Mining Council of Josephine county, reported that miners may purchase material on an AA5 priority, and under such a priority they are able to get most of the needed material if they can find it.

Childs, who served as advisor for the meeting, explained that one of the main objectives of the Siskiyou Mineral Association, as well as of the Western Mining Council, is to secure greater recognition of mining as an industry, and to bring about enact-

ment of legislation of mining as an industry, and to bring about enactment of legislation which will encourage mining. Childs pointed out that gold can be one of the greatest sources of income in Jackson county if the price could be increased to overcome the increased cost of labor in mines. Childs also explained that one of the objectives of the Western Mining Council is to change the regulations of the O. and C. Lands Administration relative to mining claims.

Any miner, or anyone interested in mining, who wishes to affiliate with the group, is asked to contact Secretary Ray, who has offices in the Medford Center Building.

BUTTERLESS WEEK MEATLESS FRIDAY

Ashland, July 14—"Butterless" meals will be served in all Ashland restaurants and Fridays will be "meatless," according to a decision reached at a meeting between local restaurant operators and ration board officials. Proprietors arrived at the decision after difficulty in feeding patrons occurred during the past two months and extreme hardship was seen for the next ration period when red points will be sharply cut.

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BUS- TRAIN SKED CHANGES TUESDAY

Important changes in operation of the coordinated bus-train schedules between southern Oregon and California will become effective Tuesday, July 17, according to Fred G. Morris, Southern Pacific company agent here.

Southbound the morning bus will leave Medford as at present, 6:05 a. m. and arrive Dunsmuir 9:15 a. m., connecting with train 15 "West Coast" from Dunsmuir 10:15 a. m. to Sacramento, central and southern California. Also connections with train 17

"Oregonian" from Dunsmuir 12:20 noon to San Francisco.

The evening bus will leave Medford 7:40 p. m. daily, 50 minutes later than at present, and arrive Dunsmuir 11:25 p. m., making connections with train 19 "Klamath" from Dunsmuir 12:05 a. m. to San Francisco and bay district points.

Northbound the bus, formerly operating from Dunsmuir at 7:30 a. m. has been cancelled. Instead the bus will leave Dunsmuir at 8:15 a. m. taking connections off train 18, the "Oregonian" and train 20 "Klamath" from San Francisco and bay district points and arriving Medford at 11:58 a. m.

The evening bus will leave Dunsmuir as at present, 7 p. m., taking connections from train 16 "West Coast" from southern and central California, and Sacra-

mento, and arriving in Medford at 10:30 p. m. All train-buses leave and arrive at S. P. stations.
