

NEWSPAPERS FOR NAVY OVERSEAS MUST BE ASKED

Your son or husband fighting in the Pacific with the Navy, Marine Corps or Coast Guard is just as much interested in news of his family, friends and home town as ever before. So here is a tip from the navy, via Postmaster Frank DeSouza of Medford.

If you want to renew his subscription to the Mail Tribune, or to any other magazine or newspaper, be sure to have him write to you requesting the renewal prior to its expiration date. Otherwise his copies will not be accepted at the post office for mailing, in accordance with a new ruling issued by the post office department and the navy department.

Keep sending letters and packages, but help the Navy conserve shipping space for guns, food, and other vital war supplies by curtailing second class matter.

This is the joint order issued by the Post Office Department and the Navy Department:

"1. Individual copies of newspapers and magazines offered for mailing by publishers, addressed via the fleet post offices at New York or San Francisco, to Navy, Marine Corps or Coast Guard personnel on duty overseas, shall be accepted only when they are being sent in fulfillment of written requests initiated by the addressee for subscriptions or renewals of subscriptions.

"2. Postmasters at the offices of mailing shall require publishers to present for their examination the requests from the addressee for subscriptions or renewals of subscriptions.

"3. Relatives and friends may pay for the subscriptions or renewals of subscriptions provided the addressee has initiated the requests therefor.

"4. Complimentary copies sent by publishers, copies paid for by advertisers, and copies sent under any kind of an arrangement whereby the requests of the addressee are solicited shall NOT be accepted.

"5. Copies mailed in fulfillment of subscriptions which are unexpired on the effective date of the addressee are solicited until the subscriptions expire."

Merchant Marine Service is Urged By Mayor Meeker

Mayor C. A. Meeker today urged Medford men to join the U. S. maritime service and help keep the merchant marine staffed with seamen urgently needed to sail merchant vessels leaving west coast ports.

"Men of Medford who are eligible under the recently relaxed enrollment qualifications for the maritime service can serve their country in no better manner than by becoming a member of this valuable crew," the mayor said in his statement.

"I urge anyone not now in a vital war industry to visit the maritime service enrolling office at Portland and help keep those war cargoes sailing on schedule."

The USMS enrolling office in Portland is located at room 202, Pioneer Postoffice building.

Edward U. Canoose Enrolls in Plane Mechanics Course

Keester Field, Biloxi, Miss., July 16—Pvt. Edward U. Canoose, 55 Ross Court, Medford, was enrolled this week in the AAF training command's basic airplane and engine mechanics course at Keester Field.

The course will extend over a 76-day period during which time he will receive instruction and actual experience in aircraft maintenance. This training will prepare him for entrance into a specialized course where ground crew students will receive additional instruction in maintenance and trouble shooting.

The training program he is following, which in addition to maintenance, includes instruction in fundamentals, electrical systems, structures, fuel and oil systems, propellers, instruments, hydraulic systems, engine operation and basic airplane inspection.

FUEL OIL CONSUMERS URGED TO FILL TANKS

Because the Pacific war will take 8,400,000 more gallons of petroleum products daily at its peak than is being used today, Chester Bowles, OPA administrator, and Ralph K. Davies, deputy petroleum administrator, cautioned fuel-oil consumers that home-heating oil supplies will be tight next winter and joined in an appeal to householders to fill their fuel-oil storage tanks immediately.

"Military needs for fuel oil are continuing to increase and will reach a peak this winter at the time when civilian fuel oil needs, too, are heaviest," Mr. Davies said. "Obviously, demands on the nation's heavily burdened transportation system will follow a similar pattern, making it imperative for householders to stock up early this summer so that dealers can refill their own storage tanks while transportation still is available."

Kaiser Proposes Steel Syndicate

Oakland, Calif., July 16—(U.P.)—Henry J. Kaiser, Pacific coast industrialist, proposed to the government today the formation of a western steel syndicate to operate a completely integrated, diversified iron and steel industry in California, Utah and Colorado.

The combined properties would be worth more than \$350,000,000.

In a telegram to S. H. Husbands, head of the Defense Plant Corp., Kaiser offered to take over the \$200,000,000 Geneva, Utah, steel plant and spend \$7,000,000 to equip it for rolling hot strip steel.

Creamery Butter Worth 16 Points

Washington, July 16—(U.P.)—The ration value of creamery butter was back down to 16 points a pound today.

The old 24-point value came to an end at 12:01 a. m. Sunday.

The OPA said the move was made possible by reduced military requirements. But it warned that points would be raised again if supplies disappeared too quickly.

Country butter remained at 12 points a pound.

JOHN SAULSBERRY AWARDED DFC FOR AERIAL MISSIONS

An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England — For his leadership on Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress bombing missions over Germany First Lt. John M. Saulsberry, 23, of Jacksonville, Ore., has been decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Lt. Saulsberry has been awarded for "extraordinary achievement" during bombing attacks on German military targets at Cottbus, Bremen and Gotha, while serving as lead navigator operating special equipment.

"Lt. Saulsberry demonstrated exceptional proficiency in guiding his formations to the assigned targets in devastating attacks despite adverse weather conditions and concentrations of anti-aircraft fire on each mission. The outstanding technical skill and courageous devotion to duty displayed by Lt. Saulsberry materially contributed to



the success of these important missions, reflecting the highest credit upon himself and the Army Air Forces," the citation stated. He is a member of the 388th Bomb. Group, a unit of the Third Air Division, the division cited for its historic mission to Africa when aircraft plants at Regensburg were bombed. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. 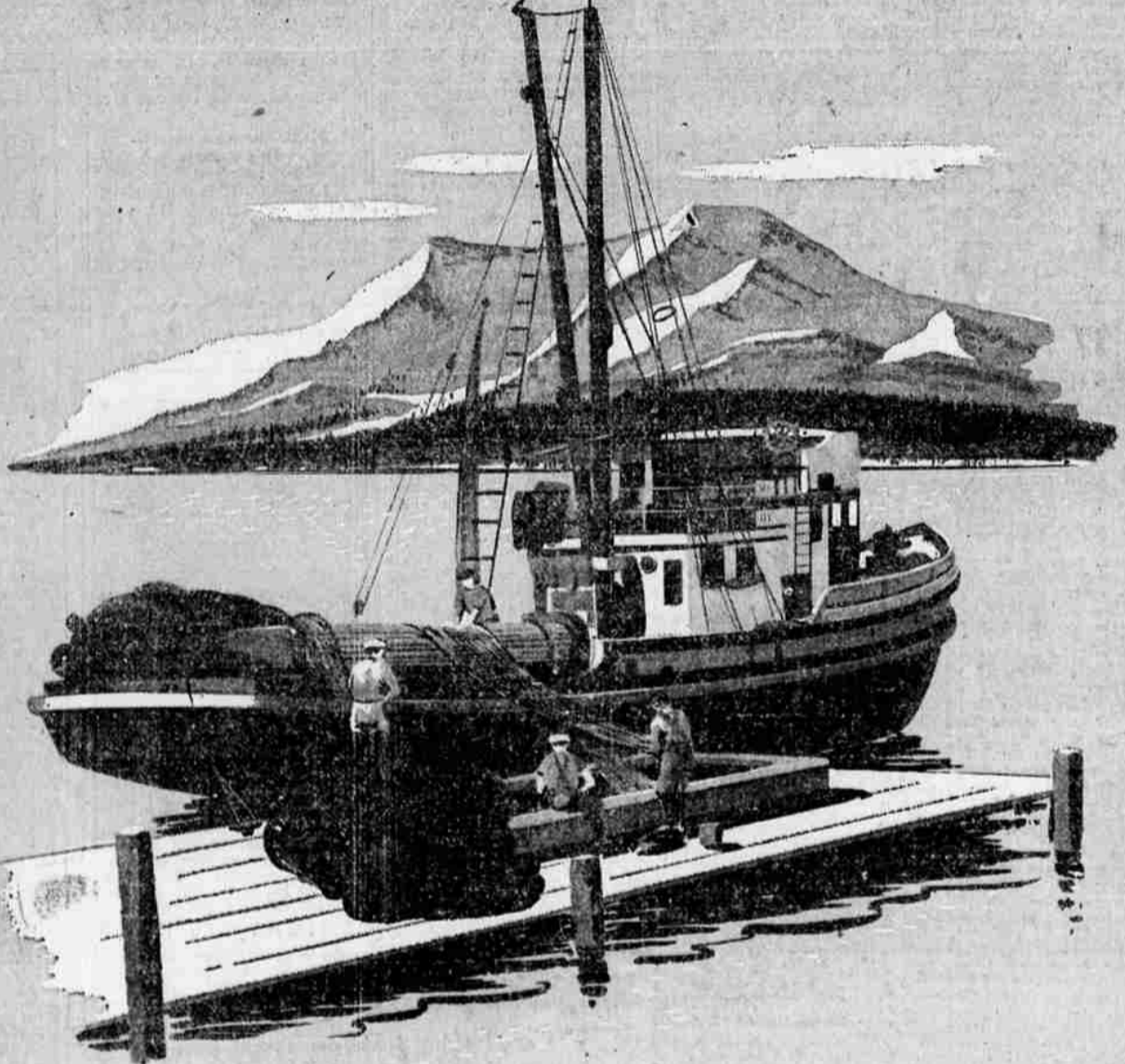
