HILT FLIER RECEIVES MEDALS POSTHUMOUSLY

First Lt. John S. (Sam) Dunaway of Hilt, who was killed in action in the Philippine Islands Nov. 23, 1944, was posthumously awarded the distinguished service cross and the air medal with four oak leaf clusters in a brief ceremony at Medford army airbase yesterday afternoon. Major Albert F. Clauss, Jr., commanding officer of the airbase, presented the medals to J. S. Dunaway of Hilt, father of the lieutenant.

Lt. Dunaway, before entering the army air corps in February, 1942, was one of the shooters with the Medford Gun Club and took part in several state shoots.

JOHN BERTMAN ARNAUD LISTED WITH NAVY DEAD

Previously reported to be a prisoner of war, John Bertman Arnaud, boatswain's mate second class in the navy, is listed as dead on a war department release today. His wife is reported as Mrs. Rowena Blanche Arnaud, 937 N. Central avenue, Medford.

At the time of his arrest, the young ex-flyer, given a medical discharge after a crash, blamed his troubles on his inability to get along on his \$100 weekly allowance.

PACKING PUPILS URGED TO HURRY IN ENROLLMENT

There are still a few openings for students at the pear packing school which commences Monday morning, July 30, according to Carroll Miller, chairman of the joint committee of the Fruit Growers League, Traffic Association and the State Vocational Education Department sponsoring the school. The school has been conducted each year for the past several years and af-

fords an opportunity for local interested persons to learn a vocation which is both helpful to the community and very remunerative to themselves, it was pointed out.

Persons desiring to enroll should call at any of the fruit packing plants, where registrations are being taken.

The age qualifications are from 16 to 35. All interested are urged to make application immediately as further applications cannot be accepted when the school quota has been filled.

Mrs. Mary Vorhels, who has conducted the school for a number of years will again be in charge and the school will be conducted at Pinnacle Plant No. 2, lasting for approximately two weeks.

GERMAN SECRET WEAPONS FOUND IN NAZI RUBBLE

New York, July 19—(U.P.)—The Army disclosed today that investigators in Germany have turned up secret weapons the Nazis never had a chance to use against the Allies.

In Hillersleben and Bad Blankenburg, nerve centers of German military research, American ordnance officers are questioning more than 150 top German scientists who had devoted full time

to devising new weapons.

Brig. Gen. Stewart E. Reifel, chief of the New York ordnance district, said many of these scientists had asked permission to continue their research for the benefit of the Allies.

Hillersleben's war laboratory yielded a projectile that is rocket propelled after it leaves the barrel of a standard gun. American officers also found plans for ammunition capable of traveling up to 94 miles, although accuracy would be poor at such ranges, they said.

A third project was a 32-inch gun firing a five-ton shell, which the Germans reportedly used in their siege of Sevastopol but did not turn on American invaders.

Intelligence officers are arranging for disassembly and shipment to the United States of

V-2 bombs stored in an underground factory at Nordhausen. The robombs will be analyzed at ordnance proving grounds here.

Ethiopia was occupied in 1941 by British and Dominion forces and Emperor Haile Selassie was proclaimed ruler of his country.
