Hoover Endorses Peace Pact

Former President Hoover is a very fine elder-statesman,—fair-minded, just, patriotic. His summary of the United Nations Security pact and endorsement of same, comprise the best argument thus far presented for immediate ratification of the document.

The outstanding virtue of his endorsement is brevity and fairness. No words are wasted and the defects of the pact are as clearly outlined as the virtues.

In fact our advice to those who still have only a vague idea of what was accomplished at the San Francisco conference, and what the new charter will do—and what it won't,—would be to carefully read this speech, as contained in this paper yesterday.

As Andy used to remark: "There it is in a couple of nut-shells."

THE only suggestion of change made by Mr. Hoover is:

"Some provision requiring the U. S. delegate to obtain congressional approval before committing this country to war."

This request has come from a number of sources. But as we see it, there is no need of a reservation to this effect.

And a reservation—any reservation—would delay final operation of the pact materially, for the change would have to be formally accepted by all the other 49 signatory nations, before it would become operative.

MOREOVER, the charter provides that in case force is decided upon the action, we quote:

"Shall be subject to ratification by the signatory states in accordance with their constitutional processes."

And as President Hoover points out under our Constitution only the American congress can declare war. Therefore it would seem fairly plain, that as far as the United States is concerned, no involvement in war would be possible, until the congress had sanctioned same.

ALSO as a practical matter, no representative of this country in the Security Council would ever think of acting impulsively or arbitrarily or without the express instructions of the government he represents.

All this could be made plain to the people and legally obligatory by appropriate action of congress AFTER the charter has been ratified as an official interpretation of same; without a special reservation.

More Wishful Thinking

It would be interesting to have a complete list of the number of times the complete defeat of Japan has been declared imminent.

There certainly have been many. The first official one, we can recall was at that famous New Year's party when Admiral (Bull) Halsey declared Japan would be wiped off the map within a year. That was three years ago and the fighting Admiral surely made a bad bull, whether or not he resembles one.

AND now because Japan is taking a terrible beating on land, sea and in the air, because President Truman has decided to abandon his tour of Europe and come home as soon as the Potsdam meeting ends, and because (we are now quoting News Commentator Swing) the Emperor of Japan asked the army for air protection and the army turned him down,—Japan is about to throw in the towel again!

AND of course Japan may,—for as has become a well worn axiom anything can HAPPEN as well as be fair in love and war.

But to this department such a beneficent event does not appear likely, in what might be termed the near future,—say by Christmas day or before.

"GERMANY suddenly folded up when the going got tough. Why not Japan?"

Because there is no analogy—or very little,—between the two countries, and their relative military positions.

Germany quit for the very simple reason she couldn't fight any longer, or at least effective fighting was impossible. She was surrounded,—hemmed in,—Russia on one side, the Anglo-Americans on the other, in a constricted space little larger than the state of Oregon.

JAPAN is in no such predicament. She is spread out over a huge area extending approximately from the Chinese wall to New Guinea, her home islands are still intact, her forces in China also with not even one enemy bridgehead established.

Japan can't win. Her ultimate defeat is certain. But no more so than was Germany's after the battle of Stalingrad.

Yet Germany fought fiercely for over two years after that.

It is almost certain Japan will not be able to last so long as that but it is equally certain—as we view it at least,—that to foresee her end in the present year is to be guilty of one of our most popular national ailments as far as war is concerned.
