

FAIRGROUND RADIO PUT IN OPERATION FOR NAVY FLIERS

Chamber Directors Told High Frequency Station Also To Be Installed in Area.

Only station of its kind in the 7th Civilian Aeronautics Administration area, the navy transport command station at the Medford fairgrounds, was officially placed in operation at 5 p. m. Thursday, Earl H. Agers from the Seattle office of the CAA told Jackson county Chamber of Commerce directors at their Friday noon luncheon meeting at the chamber.

Men from the Seattle-Bellingham airlines are now in Medford surveying possible sites for a high frequency station to be installed later, Agers added. The local station was installed to promote aviation, and expansion beyond the present 400 watt continuous wave transmitter is anticipated soon, power facilities having been installed for a transmitter with 10 times that strength, or 4,000 watts. The station is operated from the airport by remote control, and is

entirely automatic in operation, he said.

Air Strip Ready Soon
The air strip adjoining the navy station will be completed in 10 days, according to Frank Rogers, city superintendent, who said that response to the news of its construction has come from all parts of the Pacific coast. Private airplane owners and national firms have written for permission to use the landing strip and to install facilities.

Reporting for the emergency housing committee, Eugene Thordike told the directors that a housing survey has been nearly completed in Medford, and a billeting office will be opened soon at the Rogue River bus terminal to direct servicemen to available rooms or apartments. Manned by army personnel and a civilian worker, the desk will be open 24 hours daily. Anyone wishing to list a vacant room or apartment is asked to contact J. A. Early at the Holland Hotel.

Divide On Meters
John Moffat gave results of a recent poll of 86 Medford business firms in which owners were asked if they favored a parking meter system on downtown streets of the city. From the impartial list 32 said yes and 31 no, while others were not available or declined comment.

About \$35,000 will be paid local cherry growers for fruit canned this year at the Rogue River Canning Co., it was stated by Al James, company official. The company, which came into the valley last year, is carrying on investigations concerning quick freezing of valley fruit, berry and vegetable crops whenever production supplies meet sufficient volume, freezing operations this year including apples and peaches, James said. The cannery pack includes cherries, apricots, prunes, peaches and pears.

Frank Hull, secretary of the local chamber, reported on the regional meeting of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, held in Portland last week and attended by 35 representatives from the area. Points brought out at the meeting included the expansion of large industry to smaller centers, in actual operation now, and the increase in expansion expected after the war.

In a survey of 75,000 persons in all states of the union, Hull said, Chamber of Commerce officials proved that the education level and consuming lever of individuals and communities rises or falls together, the more highly educated persons consuming the most goods of all types. Introduced as a special guest at the luncheon by President Herb Grey was Commander Louis Gunther, commander of the Camp White naval hospital, who spoke briefly. Alfred Coffman from the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce was also introduced.

Langan and Dan Robinson, all of Oregon State college will be at camp a few days to help out with the program.

SCHOOL TAX LEVY ORDERED FOR CITY

Medford city school board ordered the \$199,639.90 tax levy Friday night to cover the school budget for the coming fiscal year following public hearing at the office of E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent. There was no opposition voiced at the hearing.

The total budget calls for \$338,152 estimated school expenditures, an increase of \$35,000 over last year, occasioned by an 11 per cent increase in teachers' salaries and six additional teachers for the coming year, according to the superintendent. State, county and other receipts make up the remaining \$159,505.60 of the budget.
