New York, July 23 — (UP)—Stocks extended last week's declines on light trading today. Demand lightened sharply and modest offerings often were sufficient to bring declines ranging to 2 points. Traders proceeded cautiously pending clarification of reconversion plans and the Pacific war situation.

Pan American airways, most active issue traded, accounted for about 15 per cent of all business done on the market. There were a few other actives far under Pan American. These included Pacific Tin, Electric Power & Light and Columbia Gas. Otherwise the individual stocks had a very small turnover.

Preliminary closing Dow-Jones stock averages follow: Industrial 161.67, off 0.83; Railroad 56.99, off 0.64; Utility 32.65, off 0.27; 65 stocks 61.93; off 0.45. Sales totaled 750,000 shares compared with 650,000 on Friday.
