Merely Historical Fact

How times do change!
Less than nine months ago this country was nearing the close of an exciting mid-war political campaign, and the theme song of that campaign was an old and familiar one, to wit:

"Don't change horses in the middle of a stream!"
Yes, that phrase in one way or another, was the chief battle cry, and there is no doubt, whatever, that that plea iterated and reiterated was the fundamental cause of the late President Roosevelt's overwhelming victory.

THIS fact has been brought vividly to our attention, in glancing over the files of last fall, when the editorial eye struck a quotation from an article by the fluent and sapient Dorothy Thompson of which the following is an extract:

"The charge that the supporters of President Roosevelt for a fourth term are maintaining this war is a partisan one has not been sustained. Party is not involved. No one is urging the electorate to return the Democratic party to power, but only the Commander-in-Chief of the army and navy at a very critical stage of an all-out conflict. No one denies that war is being fought as valiantly by Republicans as by Democrats, but also no one should deny that the successful outcome of the war transcends all other considerations. Nothing would so cripple the progress of that war, or so hearten the forces of Hitler and Hirohito, as word that the people of the United States had discharged their war leader and repudiated his war leadership!"

It was this department's contention at the time that the war was not an issue, that the war was running in high, under excellent professional guidance both at home and abroad, had achieved such momentum it would go on to a successful conclusion whether President Roosevelt was re-elected, or was not.

In the same issue, in fact, we quoted Governor Dewey's pledge regarding the war, and made what we thought at the time was a fairly strong case for voting AGAINST a fourth term at the approaching election.

THE people of Jackson county so voted in fact. But the people of the state and the country did not— emphatically not, to the tune of 432 to 99 electoral votes!

Now we have no wish to call up unpleasant memories, or rehash the late and lamented presidential campaign or indulge over much in that irritating refrain "We told you so!"

But, we hope we may be pardoned for pointing to a rather obvious fact today, namely, that Miss Thompson, as far as her contention regarding the indispensable leadership of one man in World War No. II is concerned has not been sustained by events.

BY a sad and tragic stroke of fate, the American Commander-in-Chief was struck down only 90 days after taking office. A decided political change in the administration has taken place since then. If, as Miss Thompson contended—only the individual, NOT the party was the vital factor in the national situation then the condition that the distinguished commentator declared would so cripple the war effort and hearten the enemy, did take place, but with none of the dire consequences she predicted.

A MONTH after the President's untimely death Germany collapsed.

Today Japan is being given the most terrific punishment a modern nation has probably ever endured. She isn't "out" as yet but she can't ward off the inevitable for long.

The war is going better in all theatres than ever before!

THE point we wish to make is simply this, and nothing else: It is plain now that the slogan that did more than anything else to re-elect President Roosevelt for a fourth term "Don't change horses in the middle of a stream" has not been sustained by subsequent events, and in retrospect must be recorded on the scroll of political history as an appealing but a phony one.

Time may show the loss of Franklin Delano Roosevelt at such a critical time in world history, was a tragic and costly one, particularly in the direction of social and political reform, but not in the direction so often pointed out in the campaign that of the effective prosecution of the war.—R.W.R.
