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# OAKLAND POUNDS BOB JOYCE FOR 8 TO 4 VICTORY

Mr. Big of the San Francisco Seals pitching staff—lanky Bob Joyce—like old Mother Hubbard went out after his 25th victory against Oakland Tuesday night and when the blasting was over Joyce was charged with his eighth loss of the season.

Oakland drove Joyce to the protection of the bomb proofs in the fifth inning by registering an 8-4 victory behind the steady hurling of Mitch Chetkovich who held the Seals to six blows. In addition, the triumph put the Oaks a full game ahead of San Francisco, now in fifth place.

San Diego routed Sacramento, 5-3, on the strength of a four-run spurge in the first inning. Los Angeles scored 11 runs during four innings and came away with an 11-2 victory over Hollywood on Gilmore field.

The Acorns didn't waste time going to work on Joyce's offerings. They pushed across three runs in the first time at bat and continued with single tallies in the second and third innings and two more in the fifth and one again in the seventh.

## STINER WORKS ON FOOTBALL SQUAD

Corvallis, Ore., Aug. 8—(U.P.)—Coach Lon Stiner today was working on the problem of constructing the Oregon State college 1945 football team exclusively from civilians, navy officers having served notice that navy ROTC students would not be available for play.

An ROTC unit will be established at OSC in September, but navy regulations stipulate the students under ROTC must be in residence one quarter before becoming eligible for intercollegiate sports. Thus, the navy men will be eligible for winter and spring sport teams.

For OSC's first varsity football team in three years, Stiner is counting heavily on freshmen to form the bulk of his squad, with additional help from discharged war veterans. Practice opens Sept. 8, with the first game slated with the Klamath Falls Marines on Sept. 29.

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# TITAN HANOVER FIGURED CINCH IN HARNESS GO

Goshen, N. Y., Aug. 8—(U.P.)—Titan Hanover, the bay wonder colt of harness racing, went after the winner's purse of one of the richest of all Hambletonian stakes today and was regarded such a sure thing that he was barred from the betting in the record field of 19 horses.

Winner of all his 10 starts, eight of them as a two year old when he ran the mile in two minutes flat, the fleet colt purchased at a yearling sale in November, 1943, for \$3,000 was rated such a heavy favorite by the operators of the Good Time track they took the unprecedented action of barring him from the Pari-Mutuel wagering on the race.

They couldn't, however, bar him from the winner's purse should he come home in front in the best two out of three one mile heats so if he lives up to his advance billing he would return his owners, E. Roland Harriman and Capt. Elbridge Gerry, many times more than their original investment if all 19 start. That would make first place worth \$27,608.33 and should Titan Hanover win it, it would be in addition to the \$30,000 which the bargain basement colt already has won in his previous starts.

## Oakland Shortstop Goes To Athletics

Philadelphia, Aug. 8—(U.P.)—The Philadelphia Athletics announced today that they had acquired Jake Caulfield, 20-year-old shortstop from Oakland in the Pacific Coast League, in exchange for outfielder Charlie Metro and two players to be named later.

The Philadelphia Phillies bought Caulfield late last winter for \$25,000 but he was unable to report because he had a west coast war job, so the deal was called off. He will report at the end of the Pacific Coast League season.

We do not always agree with Paul Freer nor with the manner in which he runs the Medford Craters but we feel something should be said in his defense for removing Jess Van Horn from the game with Klamath Falls Navy here Sunday. Freer drew considerable boos from the stands when he replaced Van Horn after a couple of well-placed hits had gotten past Freer, who was playing third base.

The Yakima, Wash., pitcher had been bothered slightly by a bad arm and wasn't sure he would be able to play Sunday. After pitching a few innings the arm became more sore and continued to pain Van Horn more each time he threw the ball. In the fifth inning, with the bags full and none out, Freer took Van Horn out amid lusty jeers from the spectators. Van Horn, who had never before in his career been taken out of a game, wanted to go to center field and allow Dick Fawcett to pitch but Freer thought differently and took him out of the contest.

Monday Van's arm was no better so he went to a physician, who discovered the trouble to be aggravated by malaria, which had been contracted in the Pacific war, and not by throwing a baseball. Had not Freer acted wisely, Van Horn might have suffered a permanent injury, by continuing to aggravate the sore arm.

Floyd Lawson regained his batting average leadership over Paul (Hoosier) Hoffard over the week-end. Lawson's figure now stands at .500, six hits out of 12 times up, while Hoffard is hitting .444, eight blows out of 18 trips to the plate. Other averages are Dick Fawcett .400, Paul Freer .385, Steve Crippen .364, Al Kircher .341, Herb Burnham .318, Dick Kidwell .294, George Gitzen .250, Fred Stammen .244, Homer Sullivan .225, Harold Lange .218, Carl Reich .200 and Don Waldron .167.
