

JAP SURRENDER WILL NOT MEAN MASS RELEASE

Washington, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—The surrender of Japan would not be a signal for mass release of men from the army and navy. Nor would it mean an immediate end of redeployment of forces to the Pacific.

A Selective Service spokesman pointed out today that under the draft law registrants are taken into service for the duration of the present war and six months after the "date of termination of hostilities."

The "termination of hostilities" does not mean when the shooting stops.

That date is defined by law as "the date proclaimed by the president . . . or the date specified in a concurrent resolution of congress, whichever is earlier."

GEN. EISENHOWER GUEST OF JOSEF

Moscow, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower arrived in Moscow by air today to be the guest of Marshal Josef Stalin and the Red Army and promptly expressed pleasure at being "among my comrades who have done so much to help in the defeat of the Germans."

His visit was expected to be a short one. It is believed he and Stalin will reach an understanding on methods to be employed in putting Potsdam decisions into effect in Germany.

As far as is known, Eisenhower's program here will include attending a sports parade in Red Square tomorrow morning, seeing a football game at Dynamo Stadium in the afternoon and a boat trip of the Moscow-Volga canal. There will be many banquets and receptions.

LAST TRIBUTE IS GIVEN MAJ. BONG

Washington, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Gen. Henry H. Arnold, commander of the Army Air Forces, today paid tribute to Maj. Richard I. Bong, top American ace who was killed last Monday near Burbank, Calif., in the crash of a P-80 Jet plane he was testing.

"Dick Bong was an outstanding airman," Arnold said in a radio broadcast. "He had shot down more planes than any other American. He had sought combat long after he might have honorably and in safety rested on his laurels."

PLAN PEACE CURB
Seattle, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Seattle authorities tonight took steps to handle possible overly-boisterous celebrations by residents occasioned by the expected surrender of Japan.

PEACE TO BRING NO SUGAR BOOST

Washington, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—The end of the war with Japan will bring with it no appreciable increase in the civilian sugar ration, an Agriculture department spokesman said tonight.

TILLAMOOK FIRE STILL IN CHECK

Portland, Ore., Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Western Oregon fire fighters today kept the flames of the Tillamook forest fire from advancing for the second straight day.

Favorable weather conditions helped the fighters maintain their advantage, but a long range weather forecast indicated warmer and drier conditions were due next week.

Forestry officials were hoping that consolidated fire trails of the past few days would hold the 150,000 acres already burned. Forest Grove and Hillsboro watersheds were still well protected.

FRENCH WANT TO SHARE HONOR

Washington, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—The French government wants to be in on the kill when Japan formally surrenders.

French Ambassador Henri Bonnet today presented to Secretary of State James F. Byrnes a request by his government to be associated with the four powers—the United States, Great Britain, China and the Soviet Union—in the act of signing surrender terms with Japan.

TROOP ARRIVALS HAVE 'SOME TRIP'

New York, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—The great liner Queen Elizabeth docked here today to debark approximately 16,000 happy troops after a voyage punctuated with good news and described as "some trip."

To the majority of the men the world-shaking war developments broadcast to them by ship's radio during the liner's speedy crossing meant simply one thing—that by the time their 30-day furloughs were up they might be too late for "The Pacific show."

Army to Discharge 4 Million in Year

Washington, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—The army is preparing tentative plans which call for the release of about 4,000,000 men in the first 12 months after the war with Japan ends, it was understood tonight.

This would reduce the army to between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 in the first year.

After V-E day, the army estimated it would discharge 2,000,000 men in the following 12 months. It was believed this rate could be more than doubled during the first year after V-J day.

NIPS GET FACTS

Washington, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—The formal allied note to Japan will go the long way through diplomatic channels, but the Japanese people were told by the United States without delay what it contains.

RUSSIA REPORTS MANCHURIA GAIN

London, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Four of the Red army's star commanders of the European battleground are in charge of the Soviet offensive in Manchuria, Moscow disclosed today in reporting new gains of 50 miles along the Chinese Eastern railway leading to Harbin.

The third Russian communique of the Far Eastern war disclosed that Marshal Alexander M. Vasilevsky, former chief of staff of the Red army and commander of the Third White Russian army that conquered East Prussia, is in top command of the Red Banner Far Eastern armies.

Under Vasilevsky are Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky, commander in the trans-Baikal sector of western Manchuria; Gen. Maxim Purkayev, commander of the Second Red Banner army on the Amur river front in northern Manchuria, and Marshal Kirill A. Meretskov, commander of the Ussuri river front in eastern Manchuria above Vladivostok.

TRIPLE TRAGEDY AWAITS MOTHER

Portland, Ore., Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Police today were awaiting the arrival of Mrs. Carl J. Graham to clear up the mystery surrounding the death of her soldier husband and three children. The bodies were discovered early this morning in the flame-seared home of the family. Police said they discovered three notes indicating that it may have been a combined suicide slaying.

MOVIE BLACKOUT IN MEXICO NEAR

Mexico City, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Mexico was threatened today with a blackout of all movie theaters throughout the country. At noon today the Industrial Union of Filmworkers ordered a strike against foreign distributors of films following their refusal to meet wage raises running as high as 50 per cent.
