

**CLOSED SECTIONS ARE DESCRIBED BY FOREST SERVICE**

Closures in the Rogue River National Forest were described today by Karl L. Janouch, forest supervisor, in anticipation of increased travel in the forest with the availability of gasoline. The closures cover only very limited areas and are as follows: Ashland Creek watershed, which includes the Ashland loop road from Ashland to Siskiyou Peak. The balance of this road is open so that one may travel via Applegate and Beaver Creek

past Dutchman Peak to Siskiyou Gap. Woodruff Meadows area above Prospect, but the Woodruff road and summer home area are open. A small area east of the Crater Lake Highway above Union Creek which includes Copeland and Bybee Creeks.

**Blue Rock Road Open**  
The Medford Corporation logging area in the Butte Falls district, extending south from Lodgepole guard station to Snowshoe Camp, including the Twincheria drainage. The road through this area to Blue Rock is open. The Deadwood area on the Dead Indian road, extending from the south Forest boundary north to the South Fork of Little Butte Creek. The Beaver Dam camp is closed but the South Butte camp is just outside the closed area. Travel is permitted on the Dead Indian road and the Deadwood-Fish Lake road. There are no restrictions to travel in other parts of the forest. Camp fire permits are required for camping in other than improved campgrounds. Smoking while travelling on other than paved or surfaced highways is prohibited.

**NEW DESTROYER**

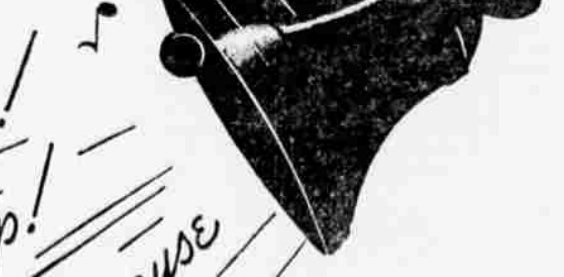

**JOBS MAIN ISSUE BEFORE COUNTRY MORSE DECLARES**

Portland, Ore., Aug. 17—(U.P.)—The No. 1 domestic issue in the immediate months ahead is full employment, Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon said today.

He declared that leaders of both the major political parties should forget partisanship and achieve unity on employment, taxation, industry reallocation and the other economic policies which must be adopted to maintain the American system of political and economic democracy. "We must make our private enterprise economy work in a manner that will solve the problem of achieving full employment and of maintaining a high standard of living for all Americans and not just for some few," he stated.

Morse said the republican party should advance and support a constructive program of economic legislation giving the maximum aid to private enterprise economy, to maintain high purchasing power and to support and advance the American standard of living. The first step, he declared, is a taxation program which will cause present frozen savings to

**Jap Goes Modern In Hari-Kiri By Using Revolver**

Zurich, Aug. 17—(U.P.)—Lt. Gen. Kiyotomi Okamoto, Japanese military attache, shot and killed himself at his home today. Thus he followed the example set by Japanese War Minister Gen. Korechika Anami, who committed hari-kiri in Tokyo yesterday to "atone for his failure" to win the war.

He shot himself with a revolver rather than using the traditional hari-kiri method of suicide by disembowelment with a dagger.

**DEGAULLE WILL VISIT NEW YORK AND CANADA**

Paris, Aug. 17—(U.P.)—A foreign office spokesman said today that Gen. Charles De Gaulle probably would visit New York, Chicago, and Canada as well as Washington during his 10-day trip to confer with President Truman. The spokesman said De Gaulle and Truman probably would discuss the French occupation zone in Germany, which is in two parts without railroad or other good communication. The Potsdam decisions and the question of transport and imports for France also were scheduled for discussion.
