

INVALID, 21, TAKES HER OWN LIFE AT APPELATE HOME

Violetta Beatriz Harrington, 21, shot herself through the right temple at the family home, a ranch house on the Circle G Ranch in the Little Applegate district, about 8:30 o'clock last night, according to Deputy Coroner Carlos Morris, who said death was instantaneous. The girl's mother, Mrs. Viola Ruff, told Morris the girl had been in ill health all her life and was confined to a wheelchair.

Morris said the weapon, a 22 calibre automatic rifle, had been borrowed from C. V. Moody, a neighbor, last spring. The girl's little brother had found three old shells and loaded the rifle, later placing it in the girl's closet, Morris said he was told.

The family was having their evening meal on the back porch and did not hear the shot, they told the deputy coroner.

Conger-Morris Funeral home is in charge of funeral arrangements which will be announced later.

RAWIN EQUIPMENT CLASS UNDERWAY

A class to train civilian weather bureau men to operate rawin equipment was begun Aug. 10 by the army at the Medford weather bureau, R. D. Church, official in charge of the local bureau, said today. Lt. Wilson A. Maxim will instruct four men from various weather bureaus in Oregon on operation of the rawin equipment, a device which follows signals from a small radio transmitter carried aloft by a large balloon. Working in fair or foul weather, it determines the direction and velocity of winds aloft.

Trainees, who will be stationed at the Medford bureau when their duties are expanded with the departure of army personnel now operating rawin equipment, are Lloyd N. DeVol, Medford; Marle H. Wittmeyer, Spokane; Robert J. Ewers, La Grande, and Austin C. Goheen, Sexton Summit. This will increase personnel at the bureau to 13 and families of the men are being transferred to Medford also.

Posthumous Award Purple Heart to Kin

Posthumous award of the purple heart to 1st Lt. Jerry Bothers, declared dead July 10 after being reported missing in action July 9, 1944, over the English channel, was received Monday by his wife, Alice, of 404 South Grape street. Also included with the award from the War department were the air medal and oak leaf cluster, received by the officer before his last mission.

LOCAL BUILDING SHOWS BIG GAIN

A gain of 595% in building during July, 1945, over the July, 1944, figure was registered in Medford, according to the report of a statistical bureau in Portland. Total for last month was \$38,490, and for July, 1944, \$5,530. June, 1945, registered \$20,120.

The most intensive building activity of any month yet this year, July building in the Pacific northwest reached \$7,256,089 in 36 key northwest cities, and showed a 112% gain over July, 1944. Residential construction was 45% or \$3,308,306 of the total, due in part to priority granted war veterans.

WASTE PAPER AND TIN STILL SHORT

Although the fighting war has ended, used fats, tin cans and waste paper are still in short supply and state salvage committees are urging public cooperation in continued salvage efforts, according to word received by Frank Hull, coordinator of the Jackson county defense council. Need for volunteer aid in salvaging critical materials will continue until reconversion to normal pre-war channels can be effected.
