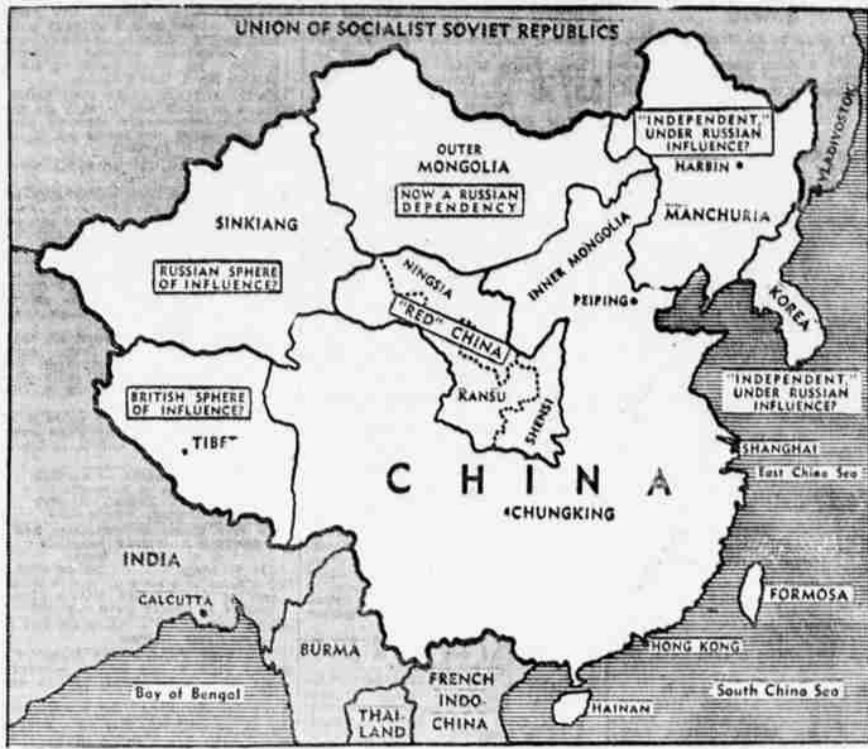

New Borders Predicted for China



Victory in Far East does not automatically restore China to borders she maintained before Japan began her series of aggressions. News analysts predict she may lose half the territory she held after World War I. Mongolia, Manchuria, Sinkiang and Tibet, under conditions indicated on map. China probably will retain control of Manchuria in return for concessions on border of Outer Mongolia, according to unconfirmed Calcutta dispatch. Outer Mongolia is expected to be made Soviet dependency, "Red China" will be under Chungking control as result of agreement with Russia.

New Superbomber Has 'Check List' Before Each Trip

Fort Worth, Tex. (AP)—The men who are to fly the Army's new B-32 Dominator will not have as easy a time in starting it as they did when taking out the family car, a "check list" published by the Consolidate Vultee Aircraft Corp., which produces the superbomber, discloses. The list, showing all instruments, controls, and indicators, must be checked by the pilot before taking off and landing. Before the plane takes off into the blue eighty different items have to receive minute attention, and another thirty items are to be checked prior to landing. Along with numerous other technical booklets, the "check list" is prepared by Convair engineers.

NORWAY TRAITOR HEARS HIS NAZI WELCOME EDICTS

Patriot Made Record of Quisling's Word — Got \$120,000 For Treachery.

Oslo Aug. 24—(AP)—Vidkun Quisling's treacherous proclamations of welcome to the German invaders in April, 1940, were read back to the puppet Norwegian premier today at his treason trial.

The prosecution rigged up loud speakers in and outside the courtroom and re-played recordings of the speeches made by Quisling when Norway was invaded. Quisling listened intently as his own voice boomed back through the courtroom announcing the formation of the government that welcomed the Nazi invaders and clamped a reign of terror over Norway for more than five years.

The recordings apparently had been made by allied or Norwegian patriot listening posts at the time. Hagelin, former minister, seedy-looking and clad in baggy prison pants, avoided Quisling's eye as he admitted grudgingly that he had brought Nazi money back from Germany for the puppet government.

Hagelin repeatedly tried to evade questions by claiming he could not remember dates and events that far back. Eventually, however, he acknowledged he had brought from Germany almost \$120,000 in British currency and had given it to Quisling. The money, he said, was obtained from the sale of paintings in the Dresden galleries. The same already had introduced German documents however, to show that \$120,000 was the sum Quisling was to have received for preparing the invasion coup on April 9, 1940.
