

# UNCLE SAM TAKES ILLINI CENTRAL TO HALT STRIKE

Chicago, Aug. 24—(U.P.)—In the first seizure of a private industry since the end of the war, the Office of Defense Transportation early today assumed control of the Illinois Central railroad to forestall a strike of locomotive engineers and firemen.

The ODT was named the federal agency to take over operation of the company's facilities in an executive order issued last night by President Truman.

The presidential directive came after a daylong conference failed to effect a settlement in the case, involving a jurisdictional dispute between two railroad brotherhoods.

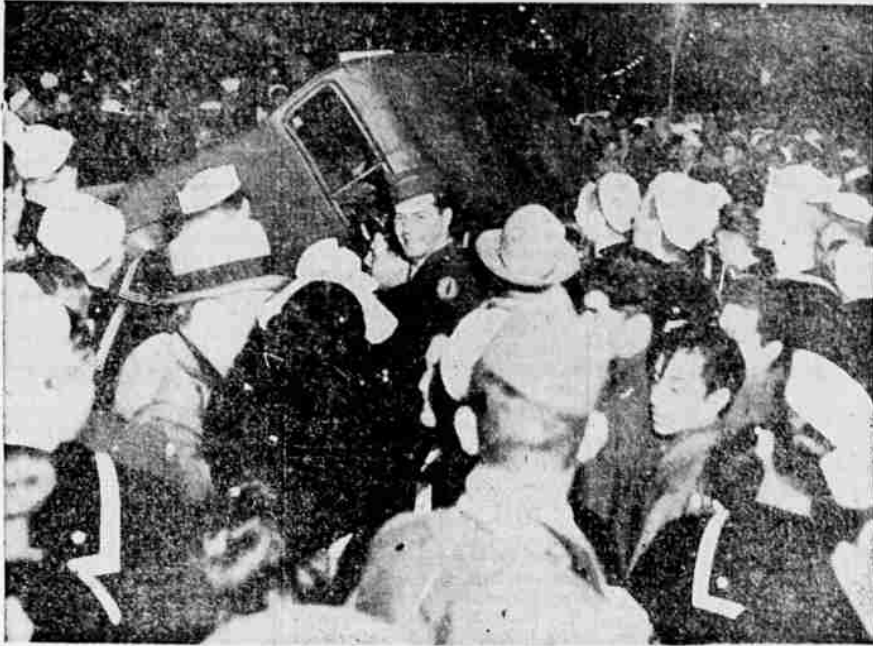
The seizure was ordered by the chief executive because "a stoppage in the railroad industry at this time is unthinkable."

David B. Robertson, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, which had scheduled a walkout for 12:01 a. m., said that the strike had been postponed for an indefinite period.

Robertson said that the union would not "strike against the government" and assured ODT officials that the men would remain on the job.

The strike, if carried out, would have affected approximately 1,800 locomotive firemen, hostlers and hostler helpers on the I. C. and its subsidiary, the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley railroad.

# BRITAIN OBJECTS TO BULGAR VOTE

London, Aug. 24—(U.P.)—A British foreign office spokesman warned Bulgaria again today that if her election is held Sunday, as proposed, recognition of the Bulgarian government will

be impossible. The new warning was issued as plans in Sofia went forward for conducting the poll which has been disapproved both by Britain and the United States. Radio Moscow, however, again today reiterated that the Bulgarian government was giving "full freedom" to opposition parties in the election.

The foreign office spokesman said that Bulgaria had "taken steps to make the results of the election a foregone conclusion."

# NATION BACK ON SUN TIME EARLY NEXT MONTH, WORD

Washington, Aug. 24—(U.P.)—Clocks will go back an hour to standard time soon after congress reconvenes next month, it appeared today.

President Truman indicated as much yesterday, and today War Production Chief J. A. Krug told senate and house leaders statutory war time is no longer necessary.

The president expects to ask congress to put the country back on sun time by repealing legislation under which, early in the war, clocks were advanced an hour to conserve daylight, electric power and fuel.

Krug sent identical letters to Sen. Kenneth McKellar, D., Tenn., president of the senate and speaker Say Rayburn. With the surrender of Japan and resultant cutbacks in war production, he said, "fuel savings from continuance of 'war time' are no longer sufficiently related to the functions of the War Production board as to justify recommending of war time for that reason."

After Germany's surrender, Krug felt that war time was still "highly desirable" as a fuel conservation measure for the remainder of the 1945-46 fuel year.

# HAWAII SOLDIERS RETURN, OCTOBER

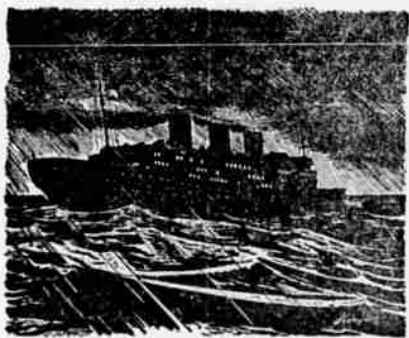
Honolulu, Aug. 24—(U.P.)—Lt. Col. Robert C. Richardson, commander of the Mid-Pacific, announced tonight that army enlisted personnel in this theater with adjusted rating scores of 85 or more points and those over 40 years of age, regardless of point scores, may be expected to be en route home by early October. He said the only exception would be men skilled in a few scarce categories who may be retained by no longer than four months.

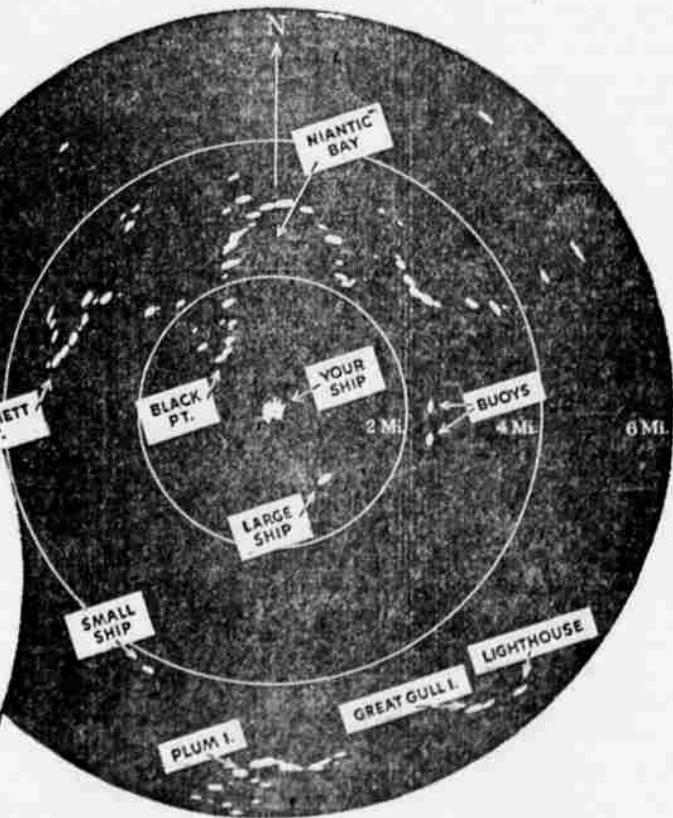
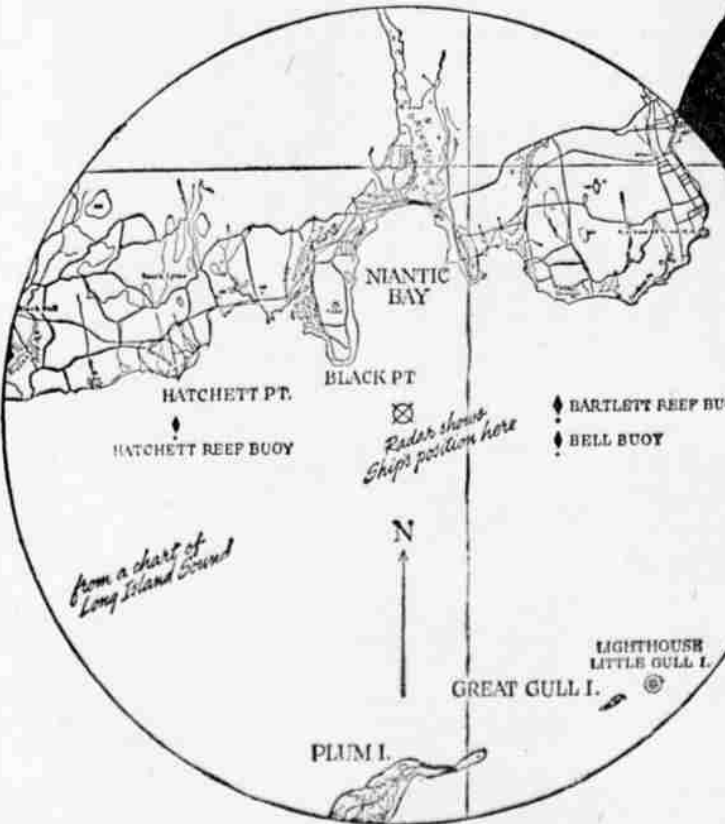
