

BROWNS GAIN 2 FULL GAMES IN AMERICAN LOOP

New York, Aug. 27—(U.P.)—The St. Louis Browns gained two full games in the American league yesterday, beating the White Sox at St. Louis 3 to 2 in 10 innings behind Bob Muncie and 4 to 1 with Potter pitching. The victories, coupled with double defeats of the Tigers and Senators, left St. Louis four and a half games off the pace. Gene Moore broke up the extra-inning game with a homer.

The Cards moved within two and a half games of the Cubs, winning a single game at Chicago, 5 to 1 as Charley (Red) Barrett won his 19th game. Just a week ago today the Cubs led seven and a half games.

Detroit Upset
Cleveland upset Detroit twice, winning the first game 3 to 1 on three unearned runs as Allie Reynolds edged Paul (Dizzy) Trout. Steve Gromek scored the winning run after singling in the ninth to break up the second game, 5 to 4, for his 16th pitching victory.

The Yankees made it four in a row over Washington at New York, 3 to 2 and 7 to 1. Catcher Mike Garbarok drove in all the runs for Charley Ruffing who won his fifth game in the opener.

Ferriss Wins
Dave Ferriss won his 20th game for the Red Sox, beating the Athletics at Boston, 4 to 3 with a 10th inning double which scored the winning run. Rookie Ty Laforest had tied up the game with a homer in the ninth. The Red Sox also won the second game, 4 to 3.

Pittsburgh beat the visiting Reds, 10 to 7 and 2 to 1. A seven run second inning sparked by Jim Russell's three-run homer clinched the opener in which Bill Salkeld also homered.

Braves Split
The Braves and Phils split at Philadelphia. Two run homers by Tommy Holmes and Phil Masi gave Boston a 6 to 5 win over Hugh Mulcahy, making his

CRYSTAL PLUNGE TAKES FIRST AAU SWIMMING TITLE

Los Angeles, Aug. 27—(U.P.)—The Crystal Plunge club of San Francisco held its first national AAU women's swimming championship today, thanks to the efforts of Mermaid Ann Curtis, who piled up 19.5 points to take high-score honors.

Crystal Plunge scored a total of 50 points to dethrone the Riviera club of Indianapolis. The defending champions scored 20 points tying with the Multnomah club of Portland, Ore.

Portland Wins Relay
In the final event of the meet, Brenda Helser, who lost to Miss Curtis by a small margin in the 100-meter free style, anchored the Multnomah club to its fifth consecutive 300-meter medley relay championship.

Miss Helser swam her 100-meter lap in the sensational time of 1:05.4, 2.1 seconds under the AAU record set by the San Francisco winner last Friday and two seconds better than the American record set by Helene Madison.

San Francisco Second
Other members of the winning Medley relay team were Suzanne Zimmerman and Nancy Merkl. The time for the event was 3:54.2.

Nineteen-year-old Miss Curtis anchored the Crystal Plunge team but was unable to keep up with the flying Multnomah club star. The San Francisco trio finished second followed by the Riviera club and a second Crystal Plunge team, in that order.

Helen Crelenkovich Morgan, Fairmont club, San Francisco, former national diving champion, amassed a total of 175.15 points for top diving honors.

Bonus Paid to Brooklyn Boss
New York, Aug. 27—(U.P.)—Brooklyn Dodger home attendance was over the one-million mark for the season today, making Leo Durocher the highest paid manager in the business.

The Dodgers, who are likely to top every club in both leagues in attendance despite the fact that they are practically out of the pennant race, drew a crowd of 18,679 for a single game with the Giants yesterday. That brought the home paid attendance to 1,000,066—and a \$10,000 bonus for Durocher.

Durocher, given a pay cut to \$20,000 last spring, was told by Branch Rickey, that he would get \$5,000 for each 100,000 increase in attendance after the 500,000 mark was reached and \$10,000 when the million mark came up on the turnstiles. Durocher now stands to receive \$55,000 for the year's work.

BROWNIES, CARDS HOLD CHANCE FOR BASEBALL CLASSIC

New York, Aug. 27—(U.P.)—There was more than a remote possibility today that "Meet me in St. Louis" will be the theme song for the 1945 World Series.

For their forlorn fans who have given up early season high hopes that the Cardinals and Browns would meet in another one-park classic it is well to consider the following:

1. Currently they are the hottest clubs in their leagues. The Cards, riding a six game victory streak, the last three over the leading Cubs, have won 18 out of 24 games. The Browns, clinching a four game streak with a Sunday double header victory over the White Sox, have won 18 out of 23.

2. Pitching, key department in a stretch drive, is brilliant on both teams. The Cards have held the leading National league batters, the Cubs, to two runs in three games. Rookie Ken Burkhardt, a 15-game winner, completed a string of 34 scoreless innings before the Cubs finally ended it. Ted Wilks and Sylvester Donnelly of the Cards have recovered from arm ailments and will be ready to pitch when the team returns home. For the Browns, Al Hollingsworth, strictly a liability last season, and Nelson Potter, a disappointment this year until recent weeks, each have won five straight games.

3. Both have reputations for gameness in the stretch. In five out of eight years the Cards have won the pennant they have done it late in the season. The Browns put on a fine stretch drive last summer to beat the Tigers, winning their only pennant on the last day.

ANSWER: Your local newspaper may be able to direct you to a community canning center.

8 QUESTION: Here's the \$64 question: Sugar?
ANSWER: Your local War Price and Rationing board will allow extra sugar needed for canning up to 10 pounds per person. And remember, home economics experts from the staffs of national women's magazines and city newspapers stand ready to help with special sugar-saving canning recipes. Consult them for this extra wartime help!

9 QUESTION: Say, it does look as if home canning might be more important this year. But what do I can?
ANSWER: The excess from your Victory Garden. Or fresh vegetables and fruits in season. Northwest crops—with a few minor exceptions—are bountiful this year! (Can all you can—nutrition standards call for at least four and, if possible, six to seven servings of fruits and vegetables every day.)

10 QUESTION: All right, you've definitely interested me in home canning. But... I'm not quite up on my canning technique. What do I do?
ANSWER: Easy! City, state and federal agencies are standing by to help you. Women's pages of your local newspapers will prove a tremendous help throughout the canning season. The Home Economics department of your state agricultural college will dispense the latest tested procedures. And the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be glad to send you numerous helpful bulletins! Your bookstore can supply you easy-to-read volumes on canning; or you can read the same information at the nearest public library.
