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FIVE YEAR TERM GIVEN PAIR FOR LOCAL ROBBERIES

Roger Clayton Marsh, 22, and Eugene Warren James, 23, were sentenced to terms not to exceed five years each in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna today.

The youths were arrested last week by Portland police at request of the Jackson county sheriff's office and made a full signed statement admitting a number of robberies in Medford and Portland. They were employed at a Medford hotel during which time they entered a number of Medford residences and stole liquor, guns, rings and cash. All of the loot except the liquor, which had been consumed and sold, and the cash was recovered, according to the sheriff's office.

They were to be taken to Salem today by Deputy Sheriff Vern Smith, who will present extradition papers to Gov. Earl Snell tomorrow to bring Robert Ben Merrill, wanted on a jail break charge, from Los Angeles to Medford.

Francis M. Neff Is Named Director Of Long Beach Clinic

Francis M. Neff, D.O., is director of a newly-established Long Beach Polyclinic, according to word received by his mother, Mrs. B. F. Neff, 217 West Second street, recently. Dr. Neff left Medford about 10 years ago. He is a graduate of Medford high school and Southern Oregon College of Education.

The clinic is a non-profit organization which was founded by a group of osteopathic physicians who realized the need of treating patients who could not

be conveniently treated in private offices. Patients who are accepted for clinical care are gauged by a standard social security process, and fees are proportioned according to their social service classification.

RETURNED COMBAT TROOPS SPEEDED HOME IN PLANES

Wilmington, Cal., Aug. 27—(U.P.)—Returning combat veterans will have their homecoming speeded up with the inauguration today of a transcontinental air transport service from the Los Angeles port of embarkation to eastern personnel centers. The first C-47 plane will fly from Mines field to Newark, N. J., with 21 returnees. A goal of eight planes per day, each carrying 21 servicemen, has been set, the war department announced. Ultimately the service will handle 25,000 troops per month.

First preference for flight from the west to the east will be given returnees whose destinations are personnel centers at Fort Dix, N. J.; Fort Devens, Mass.; Fort Meade, Md., and Indianport Gap, Pa. Maj. Gen. Charles P. Gross, chief of army transportation, pointed out that the program will not only speed demobilization and ease the burden on railroads, but will also affect economy in food.

INCREASE SHOWN LITTLE BUSINESS DURING WAR ERA

New York, Aug. 27—(U.P.)—The number of private business enterprises with total resources of \$1,000,000,000 or more each increased by 11 during America's participation in World War II, a United Press survey disclosed today.

The survey revealed that 43 business organizations in the United States now boast membership in the Billion-Dollar club compared with 32 on Dec. 31, 1941, a short time after the Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor. At this time last year, billionaire enterprises numbered 41.

Metropolitan Life Insurance company, the study showed, led the list of billion-dollar organizations for the second successive year. The company, one of nine insurance companies to make the billion-dollar grade, reported total resources of \$6,995,450,571.

OPPOSE SENDING VETS TO PACIFIC

Washington, Aug. 27—(U.P.)—Rep. Chet Holifield, D., Calif., has asked the War department to halt any assignments of European combat veterans to the Pacific until a survey can be made of other army manpower available for occupation tasks.

In a telegram to Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson made public today Holifield said he understood the redeployment schedule had been accelerated. If the schedule calls for shipment of combat veterans to the Pacific, Holifield said it should be immediately stopped.
