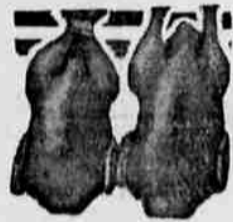

Big League Stars To Play Under Lights Here Monday

Fort Lewis Warriors, one of the greatest baseball organizations on the west coast, will play a team composed of players from Medford Craters, Klamath Falls Navy and Klamath Falls Marines at the Fairgrounds park Monday night, beginning at 8:30.

The Warriors boast several major league stars such as Bill Fleming and Dominic Dallesandro of the Chicago Cubs, Ford Mullen of the Philadelphia Phils, Danny Litwhiler, St. Louis Cardinals, Red Embree, Cleveland Indians, and Don Johnston, speed ball pitcher with the New York Yankees. The players all hold big league contracts and are on leave of absence from their respective clubs while in the army.

The all-star team to oppose the Warriors will probably be made up of Bogarski, Sirmak, Branham, West and Busch of the Marines, and Brown, Biddle, Patterson, Worthley and Gaston of the Navy plus several members of the Craters. The team will be managed by Paul Freer, Crater boss.

PACKERS TO OPEN FOOTBALL SEASON WITH COLLEGIANS

Chicago, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Don Hutson, the spindle-legged Arkansas farm boy who became football's greatest end, bids farewell to the game that made him famous tomorrow night when the Green Bay Packers meet the College All-Stars in the 12th annual all-star grid classic.

Some 90,000 fans are expected to jam Soldier Field to view the colorful spectacle and to watch Hutson, still fleet and elusive at 32, play his final game.

The skinny speedster with the over-sized hands and breakaway stride has announced his retirement annually since 1942, but this time he means it. After 10 pro football campaigns with the Packers, he knows that his slender legs can't stand many more knocks and he wants to quit before it is too late.

Leading the All-Star attack will be Capt. Charley Trippi, an army sergeant and the star of Georgia's 1943 Rose Bowl victory, and Tom Harmon, Michigan's all-American of five years ago.

Trippi and Harmon are scheduled to operate at tailback for their two respective backfields. Rounding out the double set of backs will be quarterback Don Greenwood of Illinois and Bill Meek of Tennessee and wingbacks Charley Mitchell and Edmond Shedlosky of Tulsa. Bob Kennedy of Washington State and Ernie Bonelli of Pittsburgh currently hold down the full-back positions while Perry Moss of Tulsa, rated the top passer on the 70-man collegiate squad, and Joe Strykowski of Marquette rank as the No. 2 tailbacks behind Trippi and Harmon.

GOLFERS ENTER ROGUE TOURNEY

Entries are still pouring in for the 17th annual Southern Oregon Northern California amateur golf tournament which starts with the qualifying round Friday on the Rogue River Valley Golf Course.

Eddie Simmons, winner of last year's tournament which was dedicated to Robert Hammond, killed in action in Italy, will not be in this year's meet, it was announced today.

NELSON, SNEAD IN PAR 144 AT HALFWAY MARK

Oakmont, Pa., Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Byron Nelson and Sammy Snead were out to break par today over the super-tough 7,100-yard Oakmont golf course—a feat that no golfer has been able to accomplish in 72-hole tournament play in the club's 42-year history.

Both were at even par of 144 at the half-way mark of the two-day \$10,000 war bond "blue ribbon" tournament. The other two entrants, Harold McSpaden and Gene Sarazen fell by the wayside.

Nelson and Snead put on a brilliant duel yesterday, playing the second 18 holes in sub-par after finishing the morning round above regulation figures.

Nelson put on the pressure in the last nine holes to pull up even with Snead, erasing a four stroke lead. Nelson's last nine shooting gave him a two-under par 70 to add to his morning round of 74.

Snead took a 73 in the morning and a 71 in the afternoon. McSpaden had a 36-hole total of 155 while Sarazen's was 158. Both Snead and Nelson won preliminary prizes of \$1,000 bonds for 18-hole low scores. Snead's 73 was tops for the morning round and Nelson's 70 was the best of the day.

EAST BASEBALL KIDS BEAT WEST

New York, Aug. 30.—(U.P.)—Eastern kids kept their baseball record clean in the All-American boys game today mainly because Pitcher Curtis Simmons delivered with the bat after failing on the mound.

The East beat the West, 5 to 4, with a three run last ditch rally in the ninth inning sparked by Simmons' triple, the longest hit of the night before 15,000 fans at the polo grounds.

Simmons, a powerful youth from Egypt, Pa., pitched the first three innings and although he struck out five batters left the mound with the score 4 to 2 against him. The West got all of its runs in the third.

Stanford, Calif., Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Marchmont (Marchie) Schwartz, former Notre Dame All-American halfback, will take over Oct. 1 as head football coach at Stanford University, Al Masters, graduate manager, announced today.

JACKIE WESTROPE GETS SUSPENSION

Los Angeles, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Jackie Westrope, one of the nation's leading jockeys, today was barred from racing in the United States, Canada and Mexico for the rest of the year by loss of his California racing license.

Westrope's license was revoked by the California horse racing board for a foul committed at Del Mar track Aug. 18. Secretary W. C. Buchanan said that under reciprocal agreements setting down of the jock-

key in California would bar him from all other tracks.

Leading rider at the Del Mar meet with 43 winners when he was suspended, Westrope was accused of permitting his horse, Ace Hudkins, to barge into High Sierra in the last lap of the Aug. 18 race.
