

CONGRESS MORE DATA ON PEARL HARBOR DISASTER

Effort To Clear Hull Of Responsibility Matched By Trial Demands

Washington, Aug. 31—(U.P.)—State department efforts to clear former Secretary of State Cordell Hull of responsibility for the Pearl Harbor disaster today paralleled continued congressional demands for more information and public trials for the men accused.

The state department released a Hull letter of a year ago in which he emphatically denied that his last proposal to the Japanese on Nov. 26, 1941, was an "ultimatum," as it was called by the army board of inquiry.

The army board said the Hull proposal led to the Japanese decision to attack Pearl Harbor and indirectly criticized him for forcing the issue at a time when the army and navy were desperately sparring for time in order to prepare.

The letter did not answer the army charge that Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson was not advised by Hull that he had handed the so-called ultimatum to the Japanese.

It did, however, reply to the charges that Hull failed to keep the army and navy informed of

the critical nature of the situation. Hull said that at war council meetings on Nov. 25 and Nov. 28 he warned of an imminent break with Japan and declared that the security of the U. S. was "in the hands of the army and navy."

Hull himself has made no statement on the charges except to state that after careful study of the reports he will say whatever seems called for. Officials doubted that at this time he per-

sonally would enter the nationwide debate created by publication of the Pearl Harbor reports. Some officials hinted today that the files of the Japanese foreign office, if not completely destroyed, may throw more light on Japan's surprise move in late 1941.

Some congressmen want to drop the whole matter. Sen. James E. Murray, D., Mont., sees "nothing to be gained" by investigations. Sen. Elbert

Thomas, D., Utah, urged that we try to avoid a future Pearl Harbor instead of finding a scapegoat for the last one.

Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D., Va., however, has called for a joint congressional resolution directing a court martial if the 1941 commanders at Pearl Harbor are not given one. If such open trials are not possible, he said, then congress should conduct its own investigation. Several other congressmen have demanded fuller disclosures.

Sift flour before measuring.

Heat over boiling water until scalded —
1 cup milk or top-of-the-bottle cream
Beat together until well blended, and add slowly to scalded cream in top of double boiler, stirring constantly —
1 egg yolk
2 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cook stirring occasionally until filling thickens slightly and coats the back of the spoon, about 10 minutes. Remove from heat, and add, stirring until gelatine dissolves —
1 tablespoon gelatine, softened in 2 tablespoons cold water and 3 tablespoons strained lemon juice
