VITAMINS
Vitamins have been rather elusive. But more is gradually being learned of their nature and habitat. Scientists of the United States Department of Agriculture have pointed out that "vitamins have curious hiding places." As to the amount of vitamin C in citrus fruit, much depends upon the position of the fruit on the tree and the position of the tree in the orchard. The time the fruit is harvested is another important factor, as is also the variety of the fruit. Also the apple peeling contains more vitamin C than does the fleshy part. And the red side of the apple contains more than do the other sides. Vitamin A in butter depends not alone upon the breed of cattle, but also upon whether they are pasture or stall fed. Also the content of vitamin B1 and riboflavin is greater in "braised or fried loin chop than in roast loin of pork."

COMPROMISE FOR JOBLESS PAY ACT EYED BY SENATE

Washington, Sept. 3—(UPI)—Senate finance committee members faced with the problem of writing a compromise unemployment compensation bill apparently were turning today toward a plan to extend the duration of state benefits with federal funds.
The committee plans to conclude hearings tomorrow on the bill, which would establish a \$25-a-week standard for 26 weeks. Labor representatives testify today, with industry spokesmen scheduled for tomorrow.
The proposal to extend the length of time for state benefits with federal funds—instead of attempting to raise all state funds to the \$25—26 week standard proposed in the bill—was originally suggested by Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, R., Mich. Vandenberg said in an interview that he is not yet ready to offer the suggestion as a formal amendment to the bill. However, he said, "a lot of support" is developing for it in the committee.

Vandenberg noted that the proposed bill, urged by President Truman as an emergency re-conversion measure, provides for 26 weeks duration of unemployment compensation.
"What happens to the unemployed worker after that?" Vandenberg asked. "Isn't it the length of time which is more important than the rate?"

MEAT PRODUCTION LAGS IN AUGUST

Chicago, Sept. 3—(UPI)—Meat production last month was up five per cent over July but remained 12 per cent below that of August a year ago, the authoritative American meat institute said today.
The institute, speaking for the nation's meat packing industry, reported that production in August was estimated at 1,205,000,000 pounds.
"Compared with July the August meat production showed beef and veal increased 22 per cent, respectively, lamb production decreased 10 per cent and pork decreased 15 per cent," the institute report said.
"Compared with August of 1944, last month's production showed veal, lamb and pork down 27 per cent, 13 per cent and 30 per cent, respectively; beef increased 10 per cent."

BUSINESS TO GET ELIMINATION OF FEDERAL BUYING

Washington, Sept. 3—(UPI)—Two administration leaders today urged the return of the export and import business to private trade interests by elimination of monopolistic government buying.
Foreign Economic Administrator Leo T. Crowley said the federal government ought to "get out of buying and selling" as soon as possible.
Wayne Chatfield Taylor, president of the Export-Import bank, said he "preferred" that all foreign buying here be done through "regular trade sources."

Crowley and Taylor expressed their views as the administration sought to frame a foreign trade policy for submission to the proposed International Commerce conference now under consideration for next winter or spring. The government is thinking about proposing a "fair conduct" rule for consideration of the conference which would seek to establish principles governing sound world trade.
American business men have been worried for some time that the era of foreign government "purchasing commissions" might continue after the war emergency passes. If Crowley's and Taylor's views prevail, American exporters and importers will be able to go after their pre-war customers abroad and

seek new business independently and without dealing with foreign state trade commissions.
