

JAPS SHOCKED BY WAR DECLARATION, JOURNALIST SAYS

Public Not Told Pearl Harbor A 'Sneak Raid'—Saipan Alarmed

Tokyo, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—A Japanese newspaperman told the United Press last night that "thinking Japanese" knew the fortunes of war were going against their country after Japan lost the battle of Midway in June, 1942.

He said that the Japanese public did not know the Pearl Harbor attack was a sneak raid and the populace was "shocked and

Genji Tanaka, newspaperman and chief of the English section of Tokyo's Mainichi, said the news was released to the Japanese public in two announcements.

"The first was a statement of the general staff early in the morning that war has been declared against the United States. This shocked and depressed the population because of the great power of the United States and Great Britain," Tanaka said.

"Hours later a broadcast announced a successful attack upon U. S. naval and army installations at Hawaii. Public reaction was one of relief, although why the attack was not followed by an invasion remains a mystery to this day."

Tanaka said the futile Midway expedition was not directed against Hawaii or southern California, as "Americans seemed to believe," but that "the capture of Midway and the abolishment of an operational base was the sole objective."

Tanaka pointed out, "had this been attained, subsequent attacks upon Hawaii, Alaska, and the Pacific coast could have been expected."

"The attack upon Dutch Harbor was purely diversionary and was intended to force the American and Canadian defenders to spread their forces far and thin."

"The more thoughtful Japanese felt that while the loss at Midway hurt, it was not necessarily fatal and that the war still might be stalemated with Japan retaining her conquests."

Tanaka said Saipan's loss in June, 1944, thoroughly alarmed Tokyo, and "it was a basic, crushing blow of the war, as were the fire raids launched on March 10, which fatally crippled military production in Yokohama, a city of about 1,000,000 practically reduced to ruins in one 30-minute raid."

BOMB DAMAGE TO JAPAN MORE THAN FIRST SUPPOSED

Yokohama, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—M. Gen. Curtis E. Lemay, Lt. Gen. H. Doolittle and Lt. Gen. Nathan F. Twining, three men who bombed Japan to her knees, said today that the damage their air forces inflicted on Japan was even greater than photographs led them to believe.

The three were interviewed after they returned from a low-level tour in a C-54 over Tokyo, Yokohama, Nagoya and other targets struck by fleets of American Superfortresses.

While Twining nodded in agreement, Lemay, who is Spatz' chief of staff, said that each commander had spent many hours inspecting photographs of bombed targets and studying assessments of damage.

"After seeing the targets from 500 feet, we now think the actual damage was far greater than the photos showed," Lemay said. "Target 193, for example—the Mitsubishi plant at Nagoya—was said to be 95 per cent damaged. Well, it was 100 per cent gone. The steel framework and a pile of rubble were all that were left."

SLEEPING PILLS KILL

Ruslake Green, Sussex, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—A coroner recorded an open verdict with insufficient evidence of suicide yesterday in the resort hotel death of the Marchioness of Tavistock, who apparently died as the result of an over-dose of sleeping pills.

LABOR DAY TOLL COSTS 252 DEAD, SCORES INJURED

Preliminary reports indicated today that the nation's three-day Labor day celebration, its first peacetime holiday week-end in four years, cost 252 dead and hundreds injured.

Releasing long restrained vacation desires, Americans jammed beaches, golf links, parks, busses and railroads. War-worn tires and dilapidated autos were a common sight.

On the highways where eager motorists capitalized on ration-free gas and the lifting of the war-time speed ban, the toll was the highest. A total of 139 persons died in traffic accidents, 17 in the state of California alone.

California also reported three drownings and 11 other violent holiday deaths for a total of 31, the highest of any state. New York followed with 23 Labor day casualties, 12 of them traffic fatalities.

The National Safety Council forecast 300 would die in accidents on the three-day holiday.

HONG KONG JAPS IMPOLITE, SNIPE, LATER APOLOGIZE

Sydney, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—Japanese snipers fired on royal marines when they occupied the Hong Kong dockyard, it was revealed today.

One marine was wounded before the fire was halted. About 250 Japanese were taken prisoners in the dockyard and hundreds more were brought in later.

Hundreds of Chinese attacked Japanese soldiers on sight. One was badly beaten before he was rescued by royal marines. Pro-Japanese citizens were also beaten up.

The Japanese did not send a pilot boat to guide the occupation force into the harbor. Instead the Japanese flashed warning signals. These were ignored by the fleet which entered the channel, preceded by destroyers and minesweepers.

The Japanese later apologized for failing to provide a pilot but said their instructions came too late.

WINCHELL RADIO CHARGES DENIED

Hollywood, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—Film strike headquarters today denied vigorously Walter Winchell's radio statement that the strikers will resort to violence if the walkout is not settled at once.

"Winchell must have listened to an irresponsible person," Ted Taylor, film strike publicity director declared.

"From the beginning," he said, "we have made every effort to conduct the strike in an orderly and law-abiding manner. "We expect the NLRB decision in the case some time this week, and the strikers have said from the beginning that they will abide by that decision under the

law, whatever it may prove to be." Winchell said his statement on strike violence was based on an exclusive tip.

SOCIAL DISEASE SEVEN FOLD GAIN IN EUROPE EYED

Wiesbaden, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—Army doctors, alarmed over the seven-fold increase in the venereal disease rate among American troops in the European theater, now urge imposition of the 1918 rule that no diseased soldier may board a transport for home.

The doctors warned that penicillin and the sulfa drugs won't constitute any easy cure-all for the rising tide of soldier patients.

The venereal disease rate averaged 25 to 35 per thousand men, and reached a final peak of 45, during the buildup period in England before the invasion. Then in combat it fell to 20 or 25 cases per thousand, centering in the rear echelon areas.

Now the rate has soared to 150 and 156 cases per thousand men, according to Col. Tom P. Wayne, chief of preventive medicine division and chief of the army surgeon's office. The rate has already passed the 1918 peak of 147 per thousand.

Approximately 143,000,000 acres of privately owned land in the U. S. are being protected in systematic production of forest crops, according to a recent nationwide survey.

CHIANG TO GIVE LEGAL SANCTION TO ALL PARTIES

Chungking, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek announced today the central government will grant full legal sanction to all political parties as part of the democratization of post-war China, but he called for the elimination of all "private armies" such as those maintained by the Chinese communists.

"I solemnly state today that all armed forces—if they submit to reorganization by the government and obey all military orders—shall receive the same treatment without discrimination," Generalissimo Chiang said in a victory day message to his people, at the end of eight years of war.

"There should be no private army within the country's boundaries, nor should armed forces be kept by any political party."

BITE OF SNAKE BREAKS UP MEET

St. Charles, Va., Sept. 4—(U.P.)—A Copperhead snake that bit one of "the faithful" broke up the final meeting of the Stone Creek faith healers here yesterday.

The Rev. L. Lambert, of Mid-

dlesboro, Ky., a visiting member of the snake-handling cult was the victim. He was carried to the home of one of the members here. Reported to be suffering great pain, Lambert steadfastly refused medical aid.

Although several of the worshippers have been bitten by snakes this year, none have died. The meeting apparently took Virginia police by surprise. They had raided the more widely advertised last two snake-handling sessions of the group.

MURDER PAIR HELD

Denver, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—A 21-year-old ex-convict and his sister were being held for questioning today by Denver police in connection with the mysterious death of Mrs. Rita Tafoya, 18-year-old Denver mother whose body was found Sunday in the Platte river here.

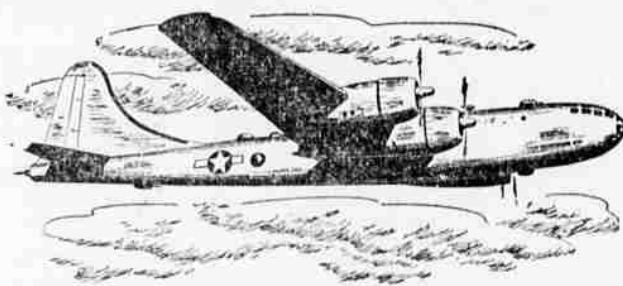

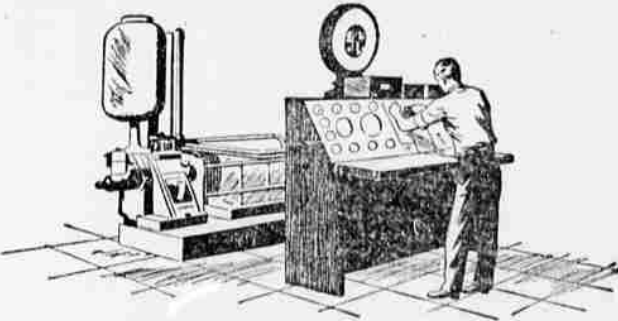
