

BUREAUS IGNORE BEEF COMMITTEE SLAUGHTER RULE

Rep. Jenkins Says Congress
Flouted By Secretary
Anderson And OPA

Washington, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—Chairman Thomas A. Jenkins, R., O., of the House Republican Food Study committee, accused the department of agriculture and office of price administration today of flouting congress by maintaining quotas on local livestock slaughterers.

He issued a statement recalling that congress had exempted more than 15,000 "class 2" slaughterers, which are not federally inspected, from slaughtering quotas if the secretary of agriculture certified that they were sanitary.

He said that Secretary Clinton P. Anderson had added condi-

tions that OPA regulations must be observed and that the meat must move in legitimate trade channels.

"No slaughterer in the world can prove those two points to the satisfaction of a government agent who does not want to be convinced," he said. "The result is what might be expected."

Because of the "unauthorized conditions," he said, only 449 of the small slaughterers had applied for exemption and only 138 of the applications were approved.

He asserted that there was more beef on the hoof than ever before but that OPA quotas were preventing packers from working at normal capacity.

NAVY PERSONNEL TO WEAR CIVIES OFF DUTY HOURS

Washington, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—The first post-war rush on clothing stores was expected today as the navy authorized all its personnel within the United States to wear civilian clothes when not on duty.

Gobs and gal sailors greeted with yells of delight Secretary of Navy James V. Forrestal's new order permitting them to doff navy blues and grays "outside of working hours while on shore leave or otherwise in off shore status."

The order, according to the navy, went into effect Sunday, Sept. 2. For some reason or other, however, it had not filtered down to the men and women of the navy last night. The first many here knew about it was when they were told by a United Press reporter.

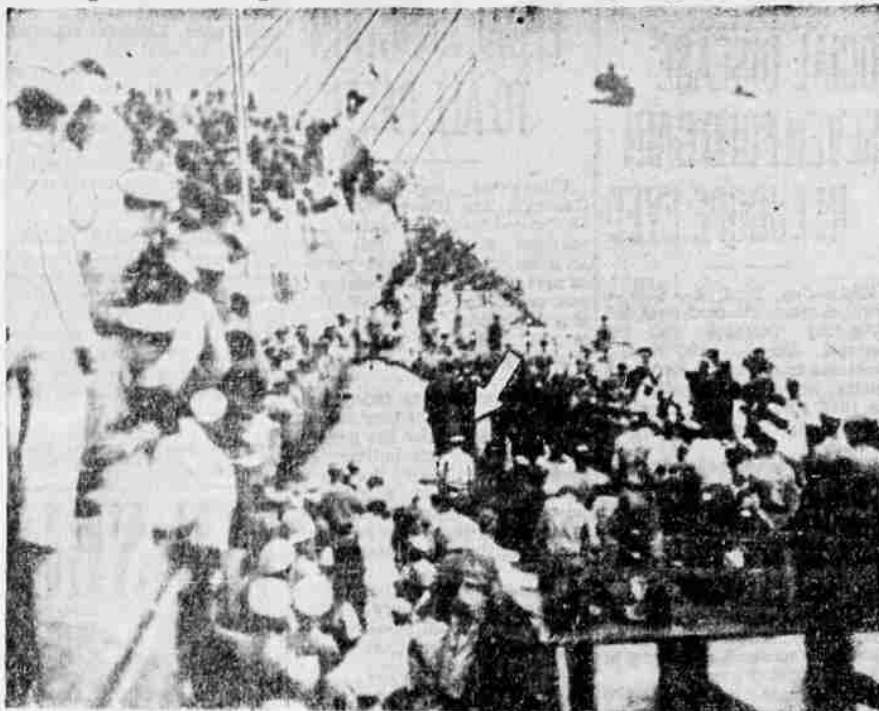
There was no immediate announcement of the reason for the sudden decision, nor was there any hint whether the army would follow suit.

The navy order applies to all naval personnel "attached to stations within continental limits of the United States and to ships in the waters thereof."

BUND BOSS TELLS WHY HIS RETURN TO REICH HURTS

Washington, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—Fritz Julius Kuhn, erstwhile fuhrer of the German-American Bund, appears before a special court in Ellis Island, N. Y., today to explain in a closed session why he does not want to go back to the Reich.

Kuhn was brought to Ellis Island about a week ago when the government closed the camp at Fort Stanton, N. M., where he had been interned and for some time had been held in a special stockade for unruly internees. Before his internment he had been serving a sentence in the New York state penitentiary for grand larceny and forgery in connection with Bund funds.

Kuhn and more than 600 other Nazis have been classified for repatriation by the Justice department as aliens dangerous to the security of this country. They have been notified of the government's intention to deport them.

Under the law repatriates may request a hearing by a special board which makes a recommendation to the attorney general, who then makes the final deportation decision. Kuhn took advantage of this right of hearing.

BRITISH OCCUPY SINGAPORE, ENDS WAR HUMILIATION

Kandy, Ceylon, Sept. 4—(U.P.)—Crack British marines were expected to land today as vanguard of the empire's might returning to the great naval base of Singapore, after Admiral Sir Arthur power triumphantly led his East Indies fleet into the famous harbor yesterday.

The material spoils of war in the formal occupation of the island will be far outweighed by the spiritual satisfaction of Great Britain's fighting men. Their re-entry into Singapore wipes out the bitter humiliation of one of the sternest military disasters in British history. Japanese forces captured the stronghold three years, six months, and 17 days ago.

Although the Japanese also used Singapore for a naval base, only the battered hulks of a few enemy warships remain. These limped into the shelter of the island after being mercilessly pounded by United States naval and aerial might in the battles of the Philippines.

Ghosts of an imperial past—where immaculate Englishmen in evening dress rubbed elbows with hundreds of different races of the East—awaited the returning troops. The town of almost half a million population, founded by Sir Thomas Stamford Raffles, was one of the last pre-war holdouts for old-time British colonial customs and power.

Members of the 916th Field Artillery battalion, which saw some of the fiercest battles in the Italian campaign, received 10 Silver Stars, one Soldier's medal, 45 Bronze stars, 60 Purple Hearts and 10 Air Medals.

Speaking last night at Peoria's centennial celebration, Vinson said the modernization of the tax structure was a basic factor in the full employment program.

Vinson said that necessary expenditures and carrying charges on the public debt would require a large budget. This, in turn, he added, would mean continuance of sizable taxes.
