Using an American helmet, Gen. Tomoyuki (Tiger) Yamashita, commander of all Jap forces in the Philippines, washes his hands of the whole matter after surrender to the 32nd Division at Kianjan, in Northern Luzon. Defiant to the end, Yamashita delayed his surrender until his government formally capitulated on the USS Missouri.

RAINFALL HELPS CONTROL OF FIRE

Aided by a quarter-inch of rain which fell in the area last night, fighters this morning have controlled the Anderson Creek forest fire according to the state forest patrol. The blaze covered about 300 acres. Crews succeeded in getting a line around the fire yesterday afternoon but lost control when a brisk evening wind fanned it across the entire northeast side of the line. The patrol stated that the army crews were released this morning, following the rain, but that the regular forest service crews and CPS crews from the conscientious objectors camp at Elkton were remaining today for mopping up operations. Officials of the state forest patrol are investigating the cause of the blaze, which they believe to have been incendiary.

Bloomington, Ill.—(U.P.)—Brides of the near future can expect something new in the way of bouquets and floral arrangements for weddings, according to Horace J. Head. Head is a flower stylist for the Florists Telegraph Delivery Assn. He has been making a tour of every state in the Union and every province of Canada the last 10 months, to give florists the latest ideas in flower styling. In a demonstration before a meeting of central Illinois florists, Head showed some of the new uses for flowers in weddings. Among these designs was a hat for the bride fashioned from a corsage of calla-glads, a bit of black lace and some black ribbon. This hat can be made in about five minutes, "while the lady waits." Another new arrangement is a bouquet for the bride who carries a prayer-book or Bible. A cross of small pink roses is fastened to the satin cover of the book. A white ribbon shower-tied with lovers' knots and rosebuds finishes the design.

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Incapable Parents Huge Problem For Children's Bureau

Pittsburgh (U.P.)—More than 2,000 children were cared for by the Children's Service Bureau last year—the offspring of "parents who have not grown up themselves." Social workers at the Bureau characterized some of their problem parents as:
1—Mothers who revolted against being both mother and father during the war.
2—Fathers who were alcoholics.

3—Mothers who were lonely and wanted to go out for a good time.
4—Mothers "who just did not want their children and never had wanted them."
The Bureau is called on most frequently because of neglect and improper guardianship of the children. Of the 2,106 children cared for last year, 512 had been severely neglected by their parents.
Among those most in need of help and understanding were the illegitimately pregnant girls under age of 18 years, the Bureau reported. In such cases, it was necessary to plan for two children—the baby and the mother.

Bureau workers make a strong plea for state licensing of agencies that place children for adoption. They point out that every human being who performs any personal service for a child is licensed—"but anyone may give him away as a baby."

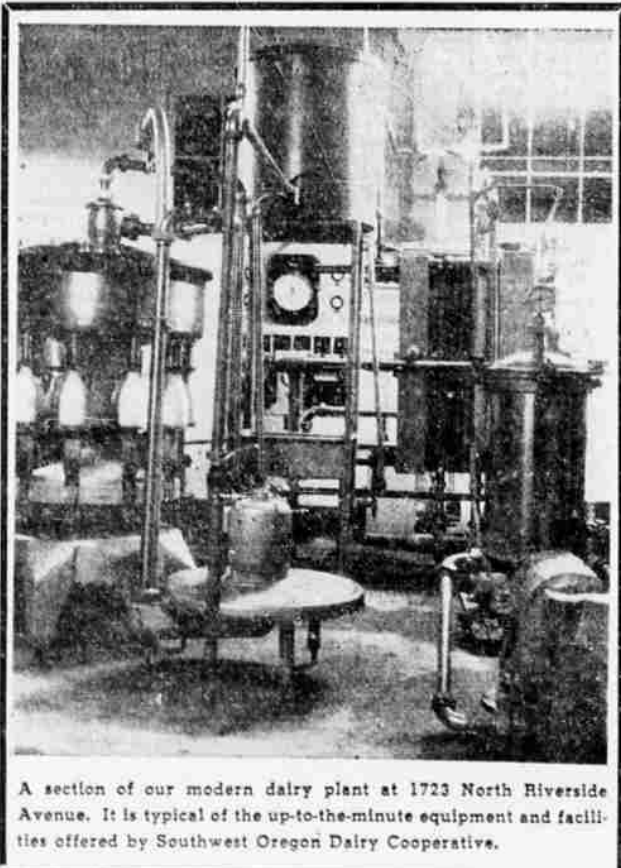
