

TRUMAN URGES HEAVY CUTBACKS IN WAR AGENCIES

Washington, Sept. 6—(U.P.)—President Truman today recommended to congress cutbacks of \$3,500,000,000 in 1946 fiscal year appropriations and contract authorization of 28 civilian war agencies.

The White House said the cutbacks recommended by the president included \$2,755,981,394 in what were described as war-related appropriations for the current fiscal year and \$794,561,208 in contract authorizations.

Military Unaffected
Military activities of the war and navy departments were not affected, the White House said.

Cutbacks affecting these activities will be dealt with by the president in new recommendations to congress within a few days.

In addition to the cutbacks, the president proposed reductions of \$9,318,307 in the 1946 limitations on administrative expenses of several government corporations and agencies. He also suggested a plan for returning to the treasury \$1,199,500 in certain government corporation funds and proposed provisions for extending the availability of certain national defense appropriations to June 30, 1946, and for facilitating the liquidation of war agencies.

First Ford Trucks Off Assembly Line

Richmond, Cal., Sept. 6—(U.P.)—The first lot of 50 trucks produced here since the war was off the assembly line of the Ford Motor Co. plant today, and officials of the company said the prewar capacity of 350 trucks a day probably will be achieved in several months.

The Richmond plant, serving the west coast and Hawaiian islands, is continuing modification of tanks and motorized equipment for the armed forces, but has virtually halted assembly of new combat vehicles.

Portland Watches For Tong Gunmen

Portland, Ore., Sept. 6—(U.P.)—Police reinforcements today patrolled the Portland Chinese district after San Francisco authorities warned that 25 gunmen were en route here to start a Tong war.

Chief of Police Harry M. Miles said he had been notified by San Francisco Police Chief Charles Dullea. Dullea said Chinatown squad had picked up a tip that differences were to be "settled" between the Suey Sing and Sing Kong societies.

RENTERS RECEIVE MORE PROTECTION

Washington, Sept. 6—(U.P.)—The office of price administration acted today to protect tenants against having their rented houses suddenly sold out from under them.

Beginning Sept. 15 OPA will require a minimum waiting period of six months before a purchaser can evict a tenant and move into his house. The waiting period is now three months.

The longer waiting period will be enforced in all rent control areas except where the OPA area rent director decides that three months is adequate. It will not apply if the buyer of the house is a former serviceman.

Price Administrator Chester Bowles said a labor department survey revealed that the percentage of rental houses has been reduced as much as 33 per cent in some areas by record sales of rental homes.

Bowles said that rent controls would be continued as long as pressure on rent ceilings remains.

DeMille Organizes Against Politics

Sacramento, Sept. 6—(U.P.)—Cecil B. DeMille, noted motion picture and radio figure, today carried a fight against political action by economic groups a step further by formation of the "DeMille Foundation for Political Freedom."

Articles of incorporation were filed for the organization with the secretary of state's office here. They declared it will work to establish the right of individuals to "work and earn a living without paying dues or assessments for any political cause sponsored by an employer, association, corporation or labor union."

"Wealthy" Suitor Commits Suicide As Exposure Near

Hollywood, Sept. 6—(U.P.)—Movie studio employe Lionel Sampson, 46, who represented himself as a wealthy ranch owner to win the love of his fiancée, committed suicide when he faced exposure, a coroner's jury ruled today.

"Mr. Sampson told me he had a ranch and stocks and securities valued at \$60,000 and that he had made a will in my favor," Mrs. Joan House, 26-year-old Australian war bride, declared. "Since his death I have learned he had nothing."

Mrs. House said she and Sampson had planned to go to Nevada last Aug. 27 for her to get a divorce from her navy ensign husband and to be married. Sampson's body was found just before they were to leave.
