

C-C COMMITTEES REPORT INCREASE RECENT ACTIVITY

Chairmen of standing committees of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce reported on recent activities of the group at the regular Friday luncheon meeting of board members held at the Holland Hotel.

A. S. Cummins, chairman of the industrial committee, spoke of inquiries concerning new industries handled in recent days and stated that plans were being made for a truck body building factory in Medford. Mark Goldy of the housing committee reviewed recent developments in the housing situation and called attention to the announcement this week that this area had been designated for erection of 50 dwelling units of the better type to be erected by private business under National Housing Authority supervision.

Clarence Winetrot brought members up-to-date on developments of the Williams Creek road project, stating that sections of forest-timber roads on both sides of the divide were assured, leaving but about one and one-half miles between which would probably be built by the forest service next year. Cooperation extended by the Grants Pass and Josephine county chamber of commerce in this project was lauded by Winetrot.

Frank Hull, manager, announced a meeting being sponsored by the Rogue River chapter of the Izaak Walton League and the Grants Pass and Josephine county chamber of commerce Sept. 13 in Grants Pass to discuss promotion of tourist travel to southern Oregon and urged a large attendance from here.

President Herb Grey announced that the next forum meeting of the chamber will be Sept. 17, with Palmer Hoyt, Oregon publisher, as speaker.

DR. SWEENEY TO LEAVE MEDFORD

Doctor and Mrs. Charles T. Sweeney, who have made their home in the valley for the past 35 years, plan to leave the city this week to make their home in Portland and Carmel, Calif. The doctor is retiring from practice and the family home and office, located on the Central Point highway, have been purchased by Dr. C. E. Kunz, local dentist. Dr. and Mrs. Kunz will reside there and he will install his dental office there soon.

Moving to Medford in 1910, when Sacred Heart hospital was under construction, Dr. Sweeney has served as a physician and surgeon in the valley and at both city hospitals. He is retiring during his 55th year in medicine.

The Sweeneys plan to make their home near their daughter in Portland during the winters and spend the summers in Carmel. Business matters will bring them to Medford occasionally.

A special program has been arranged which will include a patron Eagle initiation in honor of Hansen. President Carr advised that all matters of business to come before the Aerie will be given consideration at this special meeting and the regular meeting scheduled for Thursday will be cancelled.

During Hansen's tenure as national president, the Eagles initiated a national youth guidance program and aided passage of the G. I. bill of rights. The magazine he edits is sent to 134,700 Eagles in the armed services. The Eagle magazine has now a circulation in excess of 900,000, largest of any fraternal publication in America.

UAL PLAQUE GIFT IS RECOGNITION OF CITY'S HELP

A plaque marking the 25th anniversary of the first coast to coast scheduled flight was presented to the city of Medford Saturday by the United Air Lines. The flight, on September 8, 1920, was conducted by the U. S. Post Office Department, Air Mail Division.

Station Manager Max C. Henne, presenting the plaque at a luncheon at Hotel Medford at which city and postal officials and members of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce aviation committee were guests, said the gift was in recognition of the cooperation received from Medford officials and public since inauguration of service and in grateful acknowledgement of the cordial relations and wholehearted support given U. A. L. here.

Mayor C. A. Meeker, receiving the handsome gift in the name of the city complimented the company on its service which he said has kept pace with the great advances in aviation. He also told Henne the air line has shown a consideration for public needs and a desire to render service which has earned a large measure of public esteem.

The mayor declared the city will continue to give wholehearted cooperation in the air line's operations here and said he would give the plaque a place of honor on the wall of his office.

The plaque, a shield of stainless steel on a walnut base, bears the picture of a DeHavilland plane above an outline map of the United States with a heavy line tracing the route of the inaugural trans-continental flight. An inscription underneath the map reads: "Presented to City of Medford by United Air Lines on the 25th Anniversary of the First Coast to Coast Air Route, September 8 1945."
