PIONEER STUDIO SCENES SNAPPED

Photographers assigned by the National Geographic magazine to take pictures of Jackson county scenes and historic spots visited the studio in the home of Emil Britt at Jacksonville. It is the first photograph gallery in southern Oregon in the 1850 and is practically the same as when first established by Peter Britt, who was an artist with both brush and camera. He took pictures of many of the valley's first pioneers.

Included in the collection is the first picture ever taken of Crater lake, nearly 70 years ago. Emil Britt accompanied his father to the lake rim and due to cloudy conditions, they waited for three days for the proper light. Pictures were taken of many bedrooms in the collection, including paintings by the pioneer photographer.

Scenic spots of the Rogue River valley and its industries and orchards were also taken. They will appear in a National Geographic article devoted to the state of Oregon.
