AMINO ACIDS
The necessity for Amino Acids in the diet has been discussed. There are at least twenty-one recognized. Of these at least four are considered indispensable. That is, the body cannot make them itself out of other Amino Acids. The Amino-Acids must come from protein food. In fact, the Amino-Acids are the unit structure out of which proteins are built. So the food value of protein depends upon its content of Amino-Acids. Some proteins contain only four or five different Amino-Acids while others contain a large number. The different organs vary as to their Amino-Acid requirement. Lean meat, fish, milk, cheese and eggs are usually considered as sources for complete proteins. The Amino-Acid deficiency of peanuts may be made up by the protein of wheat. Peas and navy beans are a good source, but are incomplete, while the soy bean is considered a complete protein food.
