New York, Sept. 12 — (UP) — The Stock Market firmed fractions to around a point today, reaching a new high for more than eight years, as investors continued to show their confidence in the future of American industry.

Most of the buying was interpreted as a reflection of several highly optimistic statements on employment, particularly the assertion of the National Industrial Council that industry now is rehiring rapidly the workers laid off in the first few weeks immediately after surrender of Japan.

KERBY, JEROME PRAIRIE SCHOOLS CONTRACTED

Contracts for construction of new buildings for the Kerby and Jerome Prairie schools have been let to Sergeant and Cancilla, general contractors, Portland. The Kerby school will be an 8-room building to cost \$52,736 and the Jerome Prairie building, to have three class rooms and a combined assembly and gymnasium room, with lunch rooms and other facilities in the basement, will cost \$64,876.

According to William Laing, Medford architect who drew plans for both buildings, the schools are to be completed by the first of February.

COUNTY ROADS TO BE MAINTAINED IN FALL

The county recently received five new tires for county graders and other road equipment, and this will facilitate the work.
