Crop Insurance Sign-up Urged
Wheat growers of Jackson county will receive this week a letter in regard to signing up for crop insurance for 1946. Every wheat grower interested in a crop insurance program should contact the AAA office in the courthouse by the 29th of September, as all applications for the 1946 crop season must be completed by that date.

Crop insurance legislation was enacted by congress early this year and as the premium rates are small, only 1.7 bushel per acre for this county for 75 per cent of the normal yield, many farmers should take advantage of this opportunity to insure their crop against natural enemies, drought, winter kill, and many other factors that would reduce the wheat yield. Lamb feeders and sheep rais-

ers can now apply to the county office of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration for subsidy payments designed to help meet increased production costs and increase the supply of lamb and mutton. Applications may be made for sales since August 5, 1945, and through June 30, 1946. Questions have been asked in regard to the sale of lambs through commission houses and whether subsidies would be allowed for lambs sold under that condition. Lambs in that case still belong to the farmer and he is eligible to receive the payment. They must be sold to an authorized slaughterer and the agent is simply the go-between. Feeder lambs are not entitled to a subsidy unless sold for export to an authorized slaughterer. Evidence consisting of invoices, sales tickets, account purchases, slaughter sheets, receipts which will show time of receipt, purchase price, number of head, total live weight, whether sheep or lambs. Also a certificate countersigned by the person or his agent from whom purchased showing that the sheep or lambs were purchased for feeding.

Arrangements have been made by the AAA office for local dealers to handle the supply of superphosphate this year. Purchase orders will be issued by the AAA office to applicants and deliveries will be made by the local dealer. Purchases may be made from the dealer without going through the AAA office but the entire amount will have to be paid in cash. Farmers who wish this material should contact the AAA office as soon as possible in order to get their supply which will probably all be by January 1.

JUNIOR RED CROSS SHIPS OVER 6,000 HOSPITAL ITEMS

Jackson county Junior Red Cross has just completed shipment of over 6,000 articles for hospitalized servicemen in this country and overseas according to Miss Vera Humphrey, county chairman. Three large Christmas "units", each complete with poster, Christmas trees, table decorations, favors, menu covers and Christmas cards were completed, using color and ideas to illustrate the themes "The Night Before Christmas," "Carolers" and "Poinsetta".

Each unit will be sent to a different hospital ship or overseas hospital to be used for Christmas parties which will be planned and carried out by the Red Cross hospital workers. The work of the Junior members, who have filled the Jeep shop and the headquarters' shop this summer, will continue in school projects under direction of teacher-sponsors, it is stated. Production of articles for wounded servicemen and refugee children overseas will be the most important part of the program this year, Miss Humphrey states. "The war isn't over for them," she points out, "and we're not going to forget

them because victory has been won." The shop in the Holly Theater building will be open after school and Saturdays and adults are urged to "drop in" during the day between the hours of 10 a. m. and 4 p. m.
