

PRIZES SET FOR HEREFORD SHOW

At a recent meeting in Klamath Falls, directors and sales committee of the Cal-Oregon Hereford association laid further plans for the show and sale at Flammeth Falls on Oct. 28 and 29. Registered Hereford breeders from the three Pacific coast states have already sent in most of their consignments. A great deal of interest is being shown by both registered Hereford breeders and commercial cattlemen.

John S. Day, of Medford, president of the association, stated that premiums totaling \$1,200 would be given in first, second and third places to the winners in the different classes of cattle shown. Of this amount, Klamath county is giving \$500, the Cal-Oregon Hereford association \$450, and the American Hereford association located in Kansas City, Mo., will give \$250.

This is the first time since inception of the organization in 1938 that premiums have been given in this show and indicates the widespread reputation that the annual event is gaining in the west. Day declared.

All Group Travel Restrictions Off

Washington, Sept. 14—(U.P.)—The office of defense transportation today removed all restrictions on group travel and on the activities of travel agencies or bureaus, effective Oct. 1. The ODT revoked its order of last July 21 prohibiting organized group travel and the sale of railroad accommodations to travel agencies.

1st National Bank Marks 80th Year; Huge Growth Seen

Eighty years ago, just after the close of the Civil War, five Oregon pioneers of vision received their charter for the First National Bank of Portland. The date was September 8, 1865.

The infant banking house was capitalized at \$100,000. Capital funds now total over \$20,000,000.

President E. B. McNaughton is enthusiastic about the bank's expanded loan program designed to meet the needs of business for capital financing in this re-conversion period. He states that special emphasis is now being placed on term loans to small businesses and the bank's facilities are being broadened to handle consumer credit on purchases of long awaited automobiles, farm machinery and household appliances.

Home loans, too, are in the spotlight as Oregonians emerge from the most crowded housing conditions of history.

Naval Patients To Be Back Next Month

Chicago, Sept. 14—(U.P.)—Vice Adm. Ross T. McIntire, surgeon general of the navy, reported today that the evacuation of the 15,000 naval patients remaining to be returned to this country should be completed in October.

McIntire, writing in the current issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association, said that 1,800 naval patients were being returned weekly by ship and plane.

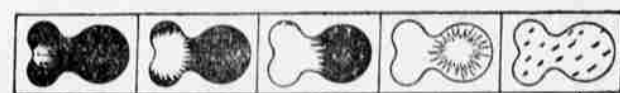

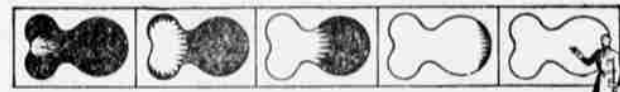
