Washington, Sept. 14—(U.P.)—The White House announced today that the presidential yacht Potomac is being retired in favor of a newer, safer yacht—the 245-foot USS Williamsburg.

The Williamsburg is an offshore cruising yacht which before the war belonged to U. J. Chisholm of New York. It was used by the navy during hostilities as a patrol vessel-gunboat and flagship for the Atlantic service force.

## Liberated Salemite Has No Bitterness For Japan's People

Salem, Ore., Sept. 14—(U.P.)—S. Sgt. Jacob Deshazer, 32-year-old Doolittle flyer who wants to return to Japan as a Christian missionary, came home today.

Gaunt, his hair thinning, Deshazer was met by his mother, Mrs. M. H. Andrus, after he received his final discharge papers yesterday at the Fort Lewis separation center.

Reporters questioned Deshazer on the way to his home about his desire to return to Japan as a missionary. He told his mother of his plan in a letter written from New York where he visited in the home of a fellow prisoner after returning from the Pacific by plane.

"I want to serve my Lord," he told the reporters.

He was asked if he had no bitterness toward the Japanese who held him prisoner for more than three years.

"They just didn't understand, that's all," he said. "It's up to us who understand the real meaning of decency to show them the way."

Where did he get his inspiration to return to Japan?

"God talked to me during my solitary confinement," he said.

## Russia to Exact Pay For Damage

London, Sept. 14—(U.P.)—The Germans caused damage to Soviet territory estimated at \$13,580,000,000 during the war, a report of the extraordinary state commission for investigation of German war crimes said tonight.

According to Radio Moscow the lengthy report said Germany must compensate Russia for damage inflicted.

Damage included destruction of 4,000,000 houses which were the personal property of the workers and farmers and confiscation of 1,150,000 horses, 17,000,000 head of cattle, 12,000,000 pigs, 13,000,000 sheep and goats and an enormous amount of personal property.

## S. O. of Indiana To Hike Salaries

Chicago, Sept. 14—(U.P.)—The Standard Oil Company of Indiana announced today plans for a general increase of 15 per cent for salaried employees and wage earners for reduction of the work to 40 hours.

Nearly all the company's 20,000 employees will be entitled to the benefits which will be applied to all earning not more than \$600 per month.

## England Laborite Advocates Pattern Of Russia Economy

Blackpool, Eng., Sept. 14—(U.P.)—Sir Walter Citrine, general secretary of the trades union congress, today advocated patterning British economy, after that of Russia.

Addressing the congress in annual convention, Citrine said: "Expressing my own opinion, I think it would be an excellent thing if the British government

were able to plan the production, consumption and general economic life of the country in the way that is done in Soviet Russia."

Citrine, answering criticism by the American Federation of Labor, said labor must get along together. George Meany, fraternal delegate of the AFL to the convention here, yesterday criticized for the world trade union congress for inclusion of the CIO and Russian labor groups.
