

## DELINQUENCY TO BE SUBJECT OF MONDAY MEETING

A round table discussion on child delinquency will be held at a meeting called by O. H. Bengtson, representative in the state legislature from Jackson county and set for Monday, September 17, at 8 p.m., at the courthouse. Bengtson is chairman of the interim committee appointed by the house of representatives to study child delinquency in Oregon.

Representatives of service clubs, the Red Cross, Y.M.C.A., Salvation Army, Health Association, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Parent-Teacher associations, law enforcement officers and all local judges, mayors of all towns in Jackson county and school superintendents, educators and welfare agencies are invited to attend the meeting, Bengtson states.

"I would like to extend a special urgent invitation to all parents who are interested in this subject to attend the meeting," the legislator added. "I am satisfied that by a real study of this subject a definite program can be formulated to improve the delinquency situation throughout the state of Oregon. A series of these meetings will be held, with round table discussions, and those in attendance are asked to express their views fully. Similar meetings are being called by other members of the committee in their respective communities and a meeting of the committee will be held in Portland next month.

## OREGON TOURIST TRADE STRESSED

Grants Pass, Sept. 15—Oregon lacks the ability to sell itself to the rest of the nation, A. Bangcroft Wells, manager of the tourist and convention department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, told the jointly sponsored meeting of the Isaac Walton league and Chamber of Commerce here. He blamed Oregonians themselves for the fact that the average tourist spends 1.6 days in Oregon compared to 5.6 days in Washington and 15.3 days in California.

Wells stressed a plan to launch a year-around program of rodeos, winter carnivals, summer activities and fairs, among other

things, that will keep the state's own tourists interested here and will draw outsiders.

"Even though we do have everything from the standpoint of nature, nature can't do everything," Wells said.
