TIGERS TROUNCE SENATORS TWICE IN VITAL GAMES

Crippled Detroit Boosts Lead In Fight To Two and One-Half Games

Washington, Sept. 15—(U.P.)—The Detroit Tigers defeated Washington in both games of a double header today, 7 to 4 and 7 to 3, to beat back the Senators' bid for the American League leadership.

Although three of their stars are on the crippled list—Pitcher Hal Newhouser, hard-hitting Hank Greenberg and second baseman Eddie Mayo—the Tigers, as they have so often this season, demonstrated again when the chips were down that they were of championship timber. The victories increased the Tigers lead to two and one-half games.

The Tigers took the second game as Trout registered his 18th victory and his fifth in eight days.

Alex Carrasquel and Mickey Haefner were the losing hurlers. The Senators, playing before an estimated throng of 33,000 which jammed Griffith Stadium to capacity, made a contest of both games, but late inning Tiger rallies proved their downfall.

In the first game, the Tigers, after a four run lead, saw the Senators come back to tie the score at 4-4 in the sixth. Detroit came up with three in the seventh on singles by Caster and Mayo, a triple by Cramer and a double by Cullenbine to win.

Haefner, seeking his 17th victory, had a 2 to 0 lead going into sixth inning and had out-pitched Trout up to that point. But Rudy York hit a home run to break his string of no-run pitching. Cullenbine then walked and Outlaw and Maier singled to load the bases. Richards' long fly and Trout's single drove two more runs across.

The Senators tied it in their half of the sixth when Lewis beat out a grounder, went to second on a sacrifice and scored on Travis' single.

The Tigers broke the tie in the eighth when Outlaw beat out a grounder to deep short, went to third on Maier's single and scored on a long fly by Richards.

Washington threatened in the eighth, but the breaks went against the Senators. With two out Lewis walked and Kuhel hit what appeared to be a single, but the ball hit Lewis and he was automatically out.

That break seemed to take the fight out of the Senators and they went to pieces in the ninth when the Tigers scored three runs to ice the game.

MICHIGAN ROUTS GREAT LAKES 27-2

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 15—(U.P.)—Fritz Crisler's 1945 University of Michigan football team took just eight plays today to demonstrate master which gave them a 27 to 2 triumph over Great Lakes Naval Training station in the nation's first major gridiron contest.

In three minutes and 20 seconds of play, the Wolverines unleashed a crafty mixture of spinners and laterals and a 17-year-old halfback that had the sailors dizzy—scoring a touchdown on the eighth play from scrimmage.

A crowd of 26,600 saw Michigan score two touchdowns in both the first and fourth quarters under a warm autumn sun.

CUBS KEEP LEAD, GIANT HOPES UP; YANKEES DIVIDE

New York, Sept. 15—(U.P.)—Chicago's Cubs remained in control of the National league race today by outlugging the Brooklyn Dodgers 7 to 6.

Before playing the regularly scheduled game the Dodgers and Cubs completed a game suspended on July 20th in the eighth inning with Brooklyn ahead, 10 to 4. The Dodgers added two runs in the ninth and Chicago one, making the final score 12 to 5.

New York renewed its hopes for a first-division finish by topping Pittsburgh, 9 to 5. The Giants now are only 2½ games behind the fourth-place Pirates.

Ed Heusser held Boston to four scattered singles—two by Tommy Holmes—as the Cincinnati Reds shut out the Braves, 2 to 0.

In the American League, St. Louis and New York split two games, each decided by homers. Keller's two fourbaggers and one by Russ Derry drove in six runs as the Yanks won the opener, 7 to 4. Byrnes' two-run homer and a three-run homer by Pitcher Hollingsworth gave the Browns an 8 to 3 night-cap win.

Philadelphia defeated Cleveland, 6 to 2, with a 16-hit attack. Chicago at Boston was rained out.
